Listed below are the CUSD Goals for the 2011-2012 School Year.

CHICO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT BOARD ADOPTED GOALS FOR 2011-2012 (Adopted April 9, 2011)

- 1. To provide every student with the opportunity to attain increasing levels of individual achievement that prepares them for success in the 21st Century
- 2. To provide a safe, healthy, and engaging environment for learning to take place
- 3. To build effective partnerships with our constituents
- 4. To monitor and adjust our district budget to ensure solvency and to ensure local control of our schools

We are making very positive progress toward our first and most important district goal of increasing student achievement as evidenced by our preliminary look at our state testing results. These results, which in their current unofficial state appear to be very positive, will be the topic of the next Superintendent's update.

While we still have much work to do, we have made considerable progress in providing safe, healthy, and engaging environments for students as evidenced by several new and upgraded facilities as well as site safe school plans.

Likewise, the building of effective school partnerships continues to be a work in progress as we reach out to our community to find ways that we can meet their needs while also asking for their support of our schools.

The stability of the District budget remains an ongoing battle due to the fact that our fiscal health is directly tied to the fiscal health of the State of California—which currently is not looking very healthy. However, as a result of some incredibly painful and difficult decisions, CUSD has achieved our goal of fiscal solvency; it is now our responsibility to ensure that we do not overextend our resources in uncertain times and allow ourselves to fall back into a negative budget certification status.

The role of the District Office is to provide support to the schools so schools can provide the best service possible to our students and families. So that we are sure we are aware of the needs of the individual employees in the district, I am asking each employee to provide me with feedback about what we, as a district, might do to assist you in achieving the goals of the district as listed above. I am hopeful that your comments will include specific suggestions regarding how we, working together as a district, might improve the service to our students, parents and community. I thank you in advance for taking your valuable time to share your thoughts and opinions.

- 1. What is your position within CUSD?
- 2. What types of support are currently provided in the District that best enable you to do your job?
- 3. What types of support are most needed in the district in order to better allow you to do your job?

Dog Parade & Chili Cook-Off: Looking for a day of fun? Plan to attend the Third Annual Dog Parade Contest and Chili Cook-Off on Sunday, September 18, 11:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m. at the Chico Elks Club. This fun-filled event is a fundraiser for CUSD Schools, raising money for art, music, sports, and sixth grade environmental camp. (See attached registration form.) **Dog Contestant Categories** include: Cutest Pug, Best Kisser, Prettiest Female, Handsomest Male, Cutest Puppy, Best Costume, Best Ball/Frisbee Catcher, Best Bark, Best Trick, and Best Owner Look-A-Like. **The cost** is \$5 per dog entry, includes owner or walker/handler; \$5 per adult; \$3 per child (age 4-18); and free for children under 4. **Lunch Options** will include: \$5 for a barbecued pulled pork plate; \$2 for Hot dogs; \$2 for Fattie's Pizza slices; \$1 for Cold drinks; \$.50 for chili tasting; and \$1-\$2 for desserts.

NEWS FROM EDUCATIONAL SERVICES:

What Are These New Tests? As a District, we anxiously await getting the results of the STAR tests each August so we can analyze the results and determine how to best help our students succeed. We have been studying the models used by districts enjoying immense success in the area of student achievement. The common link between all of these districts is a constructive assessment plan that allows teachers to analyze the standards their students are mastering and the standards that students are struggling to learn. We analyzed our practice as a district and discovered we need to build a better assessment plan to help our staff realize where the learning gaps are and give them a chance to build strategies to close these gaps throughout the school year. The new assessment plan delivers the same STAR-style test to the students three times a year. The first test will help teachers see which standards their students may have mastered before entering their class. The remaining two tests allow teachers to see which standards students have mastered and which ones the students are still struggling with, which gives teachers a chance to address students' needs before they take the state-mandated STAR test. This gives our students the best chance to achieve success on the state standards.

Tdap Clinic: A Tdap clinic for CUSD students in grades 7-12 will be offered on Monday, August 29, 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. in the Large Conference Room at the District Office. This is a no-cost clinic which will be staffed by the CUSD School Nurses with assistance from the Butte County Department of Public Health. The vaccine will be provided on a first-come first serve basis.

Need Supplies, Materials, or Books for Your Classroom? Check out <u>Donors</u> Choose. This national site allows teachers to register for a specific classroom need—anything from iPads to pedometers to pencils to musical instruments. Teachers write up the request, and donors from across the country can choose to contribute part or all of the cost. Currently, there are 10 requests posted from Chico schools, some of which have been met. The trick is to keep the dollar amount low, and make your pitch interesting: the site claims that 80% of projects with a

Grants and Categorical Programs Update--Math Grant in the Works: Katy Early, Robert Preston, and Beth Sarcona are working with Chris Yakes from Chico State and with Liz Metzger on a math partnership grant. This grant would provide three years of professional development in mathematics to CUSD teachers in grades 3-7, increasing their mathematical content knowledge as well as their ability to effectively teach math. Speaking of Grants: Congratulations to **Sue Delgardo**, Chico High vocal music instructor, who recently received a TARGET field trip grant of \$2,000. This grant will allow her to take her music students on field trips to enrich their appreciation of music.

Annual Revision of District Educational Plans Underway: Each year, the district updates its LEA (Local Educational Agency) plan, which outlines how it will meet the needs of all students. The updated plan is scheduled to be posted on the website in the next four weeks. At the same time, **Tina Keene** and **Terri Crawford** have taken the lead on updating the district Title III plan, which specifically addresses the needs of English learners. This plan will be updated and also posted by the end of August.

Oakdale prepares for WASC accreditation: Oakdale's 7-12 grade program is preparing for an accreditation by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). Teachers Kevin Dolan and Nancy Hian, along with Rhonda Odlum, David McKay, Don Williams, and Liz Metzger, are preparing the initial visit/self-study report, to be submitted by September 30. Staff is hoping for a fall visit from WASC.

Opportunity for Science Training: CSU Chico and the Gateway Science Museum is planning a workshop to acquaint teachers with the new Education and the Environment (EEI) curriculum. The EEI is an environment-based curriculum approved by the California State Board of Education which is intended to teach select existing History-Social Science and Science standards while emphasizing our relationship to the environment and how humans interact with natural systems. This initial workshop is planned to acquaint teachers in grades 3, 4 and 5 with the curriculum and with the lesson plans and resources that have already been developed to

Charter Opens: The newest CUSD authorized charter school, Wildflower Open Classroom, will open its doors to students on Tuesday, August 30. Wildflower is located on the campus of CUSD's John McManus Elementary School. This marks the first time a traditional and charter elementary school will share a campus in CUSD. CUSD was mandated by Proposition 39 to provide a facility for Wildflower. CUSD, McManus and Wildflower are working hard to minimize the impact of sharing the campus on students to assure success for all.

Testing

California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE): CAHSEE results were released this week and may be found at California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) Results. The next administration of the high school exit exam will be held on October 4 and 5, 2011, for grade 12 students and adults who have not yet passed the exam. The Chico Unified district pass rate for students taking the test for the first time in grade 10 continues to exceed the county and state passing rate.

CELDT Testing: The California English Language Development Test (CELDT) test is given each year to students identified as English learners during July through October. Schools sites are conducting annual CELDT testing through October. CELDT test examiner trainings took place in May and August with teachers from school sites trained by CUSD teacher/CELDT trainers **Tina Keene and Terri Crawford** to administer the state CELDT test to English Learners. The CELDT has three purposes: (1) to identify students who are limited English proficient; (2) to determine the level of English language proficiency of students who are limited English proficient; and (3) to assess the progress of limited English proficient students in acquiring the skills of listening, reading, speaking, and writing in English. STAR Test Results: Individual student results from the spring 2011 STAR tests have been sent to parent/guardians. If you did not receive your student's STAR score report, please contact Louise Workman at 891-3000 x171. The dates for the STAR Writing Test in grades 4 & 7 will be March 6 and 7, 2012. The STAR multiple-choice testing window will begin on April 16, 2012. The 2011 STAR test results were released on August 15 and may be found at http://star.cde.ca.gov/star2011/.

NEWS FROM BUSINESS SERVICES:

The Business Office is looking forward to a great school year. Throughout the school year we will be working toward streamlining processes, providing more site discretion, and having a bigger presence on school site campuses. The first step toward this goal is the implementation of a new Business System. The Board approved a contract with Escape Technologies in March 2011, a new business software program that will bring innovative, state-of-the art technology to CUSD. The biggest, most visible change will be online Purchase Orders...no more typewriters! The new system should be live January 2012. Pete VanBuskirk in the Business Office has been given the grand task of Project Manager and has kept this conversion on task and on target. Good job Pete! All the business, payroll, human resources, and technology staff are working hard converting from a manual process into an automated system. We look forward to the "GO LIVE" date. School sites will be brought online in phases with all schools online by June 2012. With the final conversion only months away there is a lot to get done, updates will keep coming.

Nutrition Services: Nutrition services kicked off the school year with a welcome back lunch for all department team members to work on this year's goals. As a department we are focusing on customer service, relationships and food consistency across the board. We have had very positive numbers the first two weeks both breakfast and lunch participation is up at all schools. We are currently exploring a pilot breakfast in the classroom program that would feed every student a free breakfast every day in the classroom. These programs have had some great success in other districts across the country. Some of the positive outcomes are better attendance, test scores as well as attention spans. Our new catering program was kicked off with the leadership lunch at PVHS as well as numerous events at the school sites. We have also rolled out our SB compliant cupcakes for classroom parties. We are also working on new menu items and are ready to start testing the items in food focus groups at the sites.

NEWS FROM HUMAN RESOURCES:

Negotiations

CSEA, Chapter 110: The teams met on May 6 and July 20. A meeting was scheduled for August 17 but was cancelled at the last minute due to a family emergency for a critical member of the Chapter's team. There is a great deal of work to do given that the entire contract is open. We have been making good progress and have had very productive sessions.

Chico Unified Teachers' Association (CUTA): The teams met on Tuesday, May 10, June 7, June 21 and August 24. The single issue open is that regarding the changes to the Red Plan (medical insurance) that were implemented by the JPA for the current school year.

In August 2009 the following language was added to the collective bargaining agreement between the District and CUTA:

ARTICLE 9

HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS

9.1 Coverage

No later than November 1, 2009, and extending through June 30, 2012, all unit members employed full or part time for the regular school year, along with eligible dependents and eligible retirees as defined herein, will be eligible for medical coverage as established and available through the BSSP-JPA Red Plan. Should the Red Plan no longer be available, CUTA and CUSD agree to immediately negotiate the impact and effect of such changes to provide an agreed upon plan.

Two CUTA bargaining subcommittee members shall be able to attend all BSSP-JPA meetings. Substitute costs and travel expenses shall be charged to bargaining. The District representative to the BSSP-JPA shall consult with CUTA's representatives to the BSSP-JPA prior to voting on any action items that may modify coverage. If the JPA-BSSP modifies coverage of the Red Plan CUTA and CUSD agree to immediately negotiate the impact and effect of such changes.

In March 2011, the JPA made modifications to the Red Plan that increased some out of pocket costs. CUSD did not vote in favor of the changes that were implemented by the JPA. The JPA also implemented some changes that reduced costs such as allowing all children less than 26 years of age of eligible members to be fully covered under the provided health, vision and dental insurance programs and by allowing some screening tests to be fully covered that in the past were out-of-pocket costs.

The teams have been at the table since May discussing the impacts and effects of the changes and discussing possible options to mitigate such. While the District is in better financial condition than it has been for years, we continue to spend more than we take in due to the lack of ANY cost of living increase from the State. As a result, we are living off our savings (fund balance) which, at the current pace, will be at or near zero in the next three years. We also have the very real possibility that the current State budget will not produce the income that was projected by the legislature. That will trigger further cuts to the State budget, including education. It would be irresponsible of the District to spend more of its "savings" that is needed to see us through the next few years especially given the real possibility of further cuts.

The CUTA bargaining team has expressed the point of view that the District (in the contract language cited above) guaranteed the Red Plan exactly as it existed in the 2009/10 school year to all CUTA members through the 2011/12 school year. The District's point of view is that it agreed to fully pay the premiums for the Red Plan through the 2011/12 school year and that it would negotiate the impacts and effects of changes to the plan, which we will do.

The employees of the District currently enjoy fully paid health, vision and dental insurance that is at a very high level relative to school employees in other districts and employees in other industries. We have worked hard to put all of the employees on a level playing field by offering the same health care benefits to CUTA, CSEA and CUMA members.

Through the course of the negotiations since May 10, CUTA has offered two proposals, both of which have significant costs to the District. On August 24 the District provided a counter proposal that described the current fiscal issues and offered to work with CUTA to find ways to save money within the existing collective bargaining agreement so that the savings could be directed toward the medical benefits issue. Since then, CUTA has filed for impasse. If approved for impasse by the Public Employment Relations Board (PERB) the next step is that a mediator would be assigned to help the parties resolve the issue.

NEWS FROM SCHOOL SITES:

CHS Music: Sue Delgardo, Chico High Vocal Music, applied for and received a TARGET grant of \$2,000.00 to take her music students on field trips to enrich their appreciation of music. Since 1946, TARGET has given 5% of their income to the communities they serve, equaling more than \$3 million every week.

Neal Dow Chess: The first meeting of the Neal Dow Chess Team/Club was held and sixty kids showed up. Given the immense interest, the plan is to establish a chess club AND a chess team. The chess team will meet mandatorily on Wednesdays at lunch, and the chess club will meet voluntarily on Thursdays at lunch. A busload of knowledge

Charlotte Ann Miller loves her kids—all 60-something of them. She's been driving a K-12 school bus for nearly 30 years now, and, with a huge smile on her face, Miller said she believes transporting students to and from school during the academic year keeps her young. Initially coming to Chico from Escondido 37 years ago, Miller began training to become a bus driver while working two other jobs and raising two kids simultaneously. She started out as a part-time substitute driver, eventually getting hired permanently by Chico Unified School District in 1988. Today, Miller primarily drives the Route 8 bus, transporting her Chico and Pleasant Valley High School and Bidwell Junior High students to and from school.



What is unique about this job?

I've found that you acquire this love for the kids. Regardless if they're the trouble-maker types or the quiet ones or the rambunctious ones, you end up looking forward to seeing them each day. You don't get that special bond from other jobs. I have a lot of people ask me, you know, "How do you deal with those screaming kids?" But I look forward to it ... I love my kids. They keep me young. Most people can't believe I'm 60!

Have there been any instances that made you realize how special this job was?

Oh yeah. I've run into plenty of my kids over the years who are grown up now, but still remember, "Oh hey, you were my bus driver!" I remember one time one of my rambunctious kids on the bus, he graduated and moved on, but I saw him working at the store. I told him I was his bus driver from grade school. His eyes lit up—he remembered who I was, and it was really good to see him and see that he turned out OK after all. Also, I always say "hello" and "goodbye" to the kids. One brother and sister used to never say "hi" to me, they were just very quiet and reserved, but I continued greeting them. Well now, with the sister already graduating, they hug me and everything. Their personality has changed, and I like to think I helped them.

What are you looking forward to in the next couple months?

I'm looking forward to next Wednesday when school starts. I think bus drivers are a dying profession because it's not mandatory anymore. It's really a privilege for us to drive them to school. In this economy, with fuel prices as high as they are, it's crazy how few buses are driving around. Have you seen in front of PV in the mornings? It's like a zoo, with accidents waiting to happen. I'm looking forward to keeping this whole bus thing going!





A NEW SHAPE.

Say goodbye to the Pyramid and hello to the plate! The new MyPlate graphic is easier to understand -- it's a simple matter of proportions. Fill your plate with at least half fruits and vegetables, a little more than a quarter grains (mostly whole grains), and a little less than a quarter lean protein foods, with perhaps a little dairy on the side.





Try to follow these general guidelines, too:

- ✓ Enjoy what you eat, but eat less of it!
- ✓ Avoid really big portions of food
- ✓ Eat whole grains as much as possible
- ✓ Drink milk that's fat-free or low-fat (1%)
- Choose foods with lower sodium numbers
- ✓ Drink water instead of soda or other sugary drinks

If you divide your plate like MyPlate and follow these other guidelines, you'll be eating healthy!

Try lots of different fruits, veggies, and whole grains for a healthy diet. You're bound to find a few you really like!



Spinach is brimming with vitamins, minerals, and other good stuff. And a spinach salad with hard-boiled egg,

New research indicates that eating fruits and veggies can help keep the brain sharp and may even reduce the mental decline often associated with aging.

Want to be smarter, and for longer? Follow MyPlate's advice and load up on plant foods!

PLAY HARDER

Your body prefers to use carbohydrates for energy when you exercise. Whole grains, veggies, and fruits are loaded with complex carbs, so those are the best foods to get you started and keep you going!



LIVE HEALTHIER

The new MyPlate graphic advises filling your plate with fruits and veggies, healthy grains, and lean protein. But don't forget – WHAT you eat isn't the only thing that

makes your diet healthy. The SIZE of the plate and the AMOUNT of food you put on it are important, too. To put it another way, PROPORTIONS (the way you divide your plate up) and PORTIONS (the total amount of food on your plate) both matter, especially when you consider how average portion sizes have gotten bigger and bigger over the years. Enjoy what you eat, but don't overdo it.



The philosophy of the MyPlate graphic is part of the new nutrition standards that we'll be following in our schools, too. We're cutting back on sodium, offering only low-fat and fat-free milk, using more whole grains, and serving more fresh produce. We're also looking to emphasize a variety of colorful green and orange fruits and veggies and offer fewer starchy vegetables. We're all in this together.
