School Site Visits: At their beginning of the year meeting, CUSD administrators commented that one of the most valuable, not to mention enjoyable, aspects of their job is the time spent in classrooms. The reasons were numerous and overwhelmingly positive: we learn from both the teachers and the students; we see amazing lessons that we can then share with others; we view first hand the many talents of both students and staff; and when we are in classrooms frequently, we have a better understanding of the immediate and long term needs of both students and staff. As a result of this conversation, CUSD administrators, including district administrators, committed to finding more time to be in classrooms with a goal of at least five hours per week.

As I have been to most every site now, I would like to thank those teachers who have welcomed me into their classrooms. I have seen many examples of excellent teaching—and am testimony to the statement you are never too old to learn. At a recent visit to McManus, I learned about the "power of zero" in Ms. Peggy Weis' class, something that I am positive was not taught in my fifth grade math class and I am still asking, "how can that be?". At Emma Wilson, I learned a new way to do long division that makes such incredible sense and I am convinced that had Ms. Kerry Quevedo been my fifth grade teacher, math would have been my favorite subject. At Shasta, I learned about culture, music, and my nemesis, rhythm from Ms. Wendy Aviles. These are just a few of the many highlights from my visits to classrooms and I look forward to sharing more in each newsletter. Kudos and thank you to our wonderful teachers and staff members...and our fabulous students!

CUSD was fortunate to host Sanger's Deputy Superintendent Rich Smith as part of our staff development for site and district administrators. Smith spent the day teaching CUSD administrators the strategies Sanger has used successfully to increase student achievement. These strategies include involving staff and parents in building school and district wide

structures to support student learning, creating systematic assessment and intervention procedures, strengthening the PLC process, maintaining high expectations for site principals, and building a process for principal reports to boards and peers.

Planning is underway to provide teachers and staff with the opportunity to work with Mr. Smith in order to learn more about the strategies utilized in Sanger and to discuss how similar strategies might assist CUSD as we continue to address student achievement.

Thank you to all of the site and district-level administrators for taking time out of your busy schedules for this important training.

NEWS FROM EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

Grants and Categorical Programs Update

Math Grant submitted: The Chico Mathematics Project (through CSU Chico) and CUSD finalized and submitted a three-year math partnership grant to the California Department of Education. We will learn whether or not we are funded in December, and if we are, we will hit the ground running in the spring. Want to take part? There are still a few spots left. If you teach in grades 3-7 and are interested in high-quality professional development in mathematics (including a summer workshop and school-year coaching and an annual stipend), contact Katy Early at kearly@csuchico.edu.

Chico's Newest Old School Prepares for Accreditation: In 1996, the CUSD implemented an independent study program to offer an instructional alternative for approximately 50 CUSD students in grades K-12. In 2001, the program became a separate school – Oakdale - housed on the campus of Bidwell Junior High. The 9-12 portion of the school was closed in 2009-2010, as CUSD decided to have each secondary site be responsible for their students independent study needs. This year, Oakdale, now housed on the Fair View High campus, has been redesigned as a grade 7-12 program for students interested in an alternative education. Because Oakdale has reopened as a new secondary school, it is currently working toward its initial WASC accreditation. Kevin Dolan, Nancy Hian, Rhonda Odlum and David McKay are preparing the initial self-study for submission by September 30, and hoping for a visit from a WASC team this fall.

Book-in-Common Kick-Off and Invitation: Thursday, September 22, was the kick-off for Chico's Book-in-Common. The Book-in-common program is an effort to get everyone in Chico to read the same book and engage in activities, discussions, and thinking about its themes and context. This year's book is Dave Eggers' *Zeitoun*, a moving true story of one family in New Orleans during and just after Katrina. CSU Chico has offered to help CUSD purchase copies of the novel so that staff and students can be part of this community-wide conversation. CTE Advisory Committee Reconfigured: Ed Code requires that the governing board of each school district appoint a career-technical education (CTE) advisory committee to develop recommendations on the program and to provide liaison between the district and potential employers. Chico Unified appointed a CTE advisory committee in 2007; however, since that time, the majority of the original members have retired or changed jobs. Thus, on September 21, the board appointed a new CTE Advisory Committee, consisting of representatives of business and industry along with site, district, and ROP staff. Abeo visit: Thanks to an EETT-C grant focusing on postsecondary readiness, a group of teachers and administrators from Chico and Pleasant Valley High Schools spent September 20-21 with staff from Abeo School Change, a Seattle-based group that partners with schools and systems to examine and improve student learning. Specifically, the work during those two days centered on teachers examining their assignments against a set of college-ready rubrics to assess the extent to which their assignments were preparing students for the rigors of postsecondary work. Thanks to **Stephanie Starmer, John Klein, Marcelle Gregoire**, and **Connie Chrysler** for organizing this effort, as well as to the teachers who took part. Information from the workshops, and from possible future workshops, will be shared in the weeks to come.

District Advisory Council (DAC): The DAC will have their first meeting of the year on September 29. There are two classified representatives, a teacher representative from each school and from administration. The main purpose of the DAC will be to provide a forum for open two-way communication between the district and school sites. Future meeting dates will be decided at the first meeting.

PE Testing Software Pilot: Teachers in grades 5, 7 and 9 who administer the annual state Physical Fitness Test will soon have the opportunity to pilot electronic data collection software which will provide teachers and students immediate feedback about performance on the PE test.

K-1 Assessment Pilot: During the first certificated district-wide meeting on September 14, teachers of grades K-1 received initial training from teachers Laura Manning and Nancy Barry in a software program (ESGI) that assists teachers assessing student progress in learning the foundations of reading and math. The software reduces the time needed to individually assess and record each student's progress, providing instructional time.

Accountability Progress Report: An overview report of recently released state and federal accountability data was presented at the September 21 regular board meeting. Data included the 2011 Growth Academic Performance Index (API), 2011 Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP), 2011–12 Program Improvement (PI) and 2010-2011 California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE), and the Standardized Testing & Reporting (STAR) results. CUSD's district API has gone over the 800 API mark, although the 800 state target is technically for schools. CUSD's district API growth of 14 exceeded the state average API growth of 10.

CALPADS: To fully comply with federal accountability requirements, California has enacted a data collection and reporting system, California Longitudinal Pupil Achievement Data System (CALPADS). Collection and reporting of this data is a joint effort between all CUSD schools, Business Services, Educational Services, Human Resources, Information Technology, and Nutrition Services. Staff from some of these departments met this week to coordinate CALPADS data collection, including Jennifer McCall, Joe Loomis, Mike Ruffner, Jason Gregg, Jennifer Bevers, Mike Morris, Heather Deaver, Marilyn Tritt, and Julie Suniga.

Jennifer McCall, Joe Loomis, Mike Ruffner, Jason Gregg, Jennifer Bevers, and Mike Morris also attended a CALPADS in Aeries workshop in Sacramento on September 12.

California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE): Annual training for CAHSEE site testing coordinators will take place on September 23. Testing department staff Louise Workman, Jennifer Bevers and Mike Morris will deliver the training with coordinators Damon Whittaker, Cindy Engberg, Doneld Williams, Lori Castaldo, Brian Boyer, and Dan La Bar. The next administration of the high school exit exam will be held on October 4 and 5, 2011, for grade 12 students and adults who have not yet passed the exam. The Chico Unified district pass rate for students taking the test for the first time in grade 10 continues to exceed the county and state passing rate.

CELDT Testing: The California English Language Development Test (CELDT) test is given each year to students identified as English learners during July through October. The CELDT

has three purposes: (1) to identify students who are limited English proficient; (2) to determine the level of English language proficiency of students who are limited English proficient; and (3) to assess the progress of limited English proficient students in acquiring the skills of listening, reading, speaking, and writing in English. STAR Test Results: Individual student results from the spring 2011 STAR tests have been sent to parent/guardians. If you did not receive your student's STAR score report, please contact **Louise Workman** at 891-3000 x171. The dates for the STAR Writing Test in grades 4 & 7 will be March 6 and 7, 2012. The STAR multiple-choice testing window will begin on April 16, 2012. The 2011 STAR test results were released on August 15 and may be found at www.star.cde.ca.gov/star2011/.

District Assessment: Students in grades 2-11 were assessed in English and Math at the beginning of the school year to establish a baseline for measuring progress in the learning. Students will be assessed two more times to track progress and identify learning needs prior to the state STAR tests in mid-April. NEWS FROM BUSINESS SERVICES:



Facilities: Late last winter CUSD selected SolarCity as our Partner in a Power Purchase Agreement (PPA). This agreement allowed SolarCity to install solar panels on our property with the guarantee that CUSD will buy all of the power generated from them. We are making significant progress with the installation of solar power generating systems on four of our campuses and on our Corp Yard property. The projects at Chico High School and Pleasant Valley High School are nearly completed and will begin to produce solar energy before the end of the week! The district will soon be reaping the financial benefit of reduced electrical bills. We have heard a lot of positive comments regarding these systems. Parents are especially pleased with the added security provided by the lighting in the parking lots at night and students and staff love the addition of shaded parking spaces. In the near future, we will begin installation of a ground mounted system at Marsh Junior High School and covered parking structures at Chapman Elementary School will follow along next spring.

It is our goal to support the City of Chico's emissions reduction goals through educational outreach and by encouraging citizen action. As a supplement to these projects, we are excited to announce the kick-off of "Solar Chico", a community partnership between CUSD and SolarCity designed to celebrate our commitment to clean energy. This partnership hopes to inspire the local community to go solar and/or complete energy upgrade projects through a collaborative purchasing approach that offers significant discounts to customers and raises

funds for local school projects at the same time. Each residential customer who participates in the program will receive a substantial discount on the purchase of a solar system and a referral fee will be contributed to CUSD to be utilized for facilities projects. Commercial businesses can also participate. The district is planning to hold a **ribbon cutting ceremony** to celebrate the completion of both high school projects at **Pleasant Valley High School** on **Thursday**, **October 6, 2011, at 3:30 p.m**. and we intend to launch this program at the celebration and media event. We are hoping to have a lot of student and staff participation, **so please join us**!

Maintenance and Operations (M&O): For the second year in a row, the M&O crew entered



The Annual Dog Parade and Chili Cook-off. The event was held on Sunday September 18, 11:00am-4:00pm at the Chico Elks lodge. The "John Wayne Chili" crew consisted of Chefs John Carver and Julie Kistle; Decorators Darci Bruggman and Mary Wrysinski; and Cameraman Randy Salado. Items they worked on included irrigation issues, ball wall reconstruction, and touchup painting, to name just a few. They would like to thank all the members of our community and school personnel who got involved with this event. They would also like to thank CSEA for their flexibility in working with the community on these volunteer-based school improvements.

Nutrition Services: Nutrition Services is starting new garden bars at the secondary level. The new bars will allow students to dress their own burgers, salads, sandwiches with tomato, onion, lettuce, pickles and other fresh items. This will help promote our heather choices. Five elementary sites will roll out a new menu with five entree choices daily. This will be a test to see if we can move forward with all elementary sites.

Information Technology--Web Filtering Changes Coming: Web filtering is something that all K-12 institutions must have if they receive federal funding. This is part of the Child Internet Protection Act (CIPA) and requires us to block inappropriate websites. The system we use is managed by Butte County Office of Education. The policy we had in place before last year for web filtering was the same web policy for all users (Staff and students). We have many cases where the web filtering blocks access to needed sites for information. For example, California Lottery is a blocked site because we block gambling and it is categorized as gambling. But when someone needs information about how much money came from the Lottery they cannot look up the information. The old policy had a temporary password that was entered that would override all the web filtering. This helped in many cases. However, we had many issues with the password override accounts getting in the hands of students. It had become such a problem that we were changing the passwords frequently, sometimes weekly. To solve the issue of the

password overrides we implemented a tiered filtering policy system last year. The filtering policies are based on the CUSD computer login and works with district Windows computers. The user login (the same that is used for Webmail) determines if the user is staff or student. The student/staff policies are tiers and have different filtering policies. This is different for staff (which will have more access) or student (which will have the mandated CIPA policy). The system now can track all usage (by the county) based on user login ID. It is very important that teachers and staff safeguard and protect their individual computer login credentials.

HELPDESK "**Help Me... Help You...**": The helpdesk system has built-in features that can help get your work orders to the right person quickly. If you begin your subject line with a two digit school abbreviation (listed below), it will route to the technician(s) who supports your site. Otherwise, the ticket has to be manually reviewed and takes time to research what site/technician needs to be assigned to the work order. Also, any additional or more specific information you can provide in the body of the message will help us to respond to your work orders. Below is the list of school sites and Abbreviation codes.


instructional time due to fewer nurse visits, less tardiness and absenteeism and fewer disruptions.

Healthy habits and simple actions will help reduce your risk of flu and other illnesses.

New Foods, New Year: Parenting Strategies for Good Nutrition

Research shows that when compared to picky eaters, children who enjoy a greater variety of foods have more nutritious diets. As the variety of food increases, so does the variety of nutrients needed for growth, development and general health. However, encouraging children to try new foods can be a challenge.

When parents present healthy meals and snacks in a pleasant and unassuming manner, children will learn to enjoy and appreciate a wide variety of food. This can seem more easily said than done, but here is some help!

Here are some DOs and DON'Ts when it comes to providing new foods to your children:

Eat healthfully yourself. Children are influenced by parents, particularly the parent of the same gender.	Coax or beg children to eat.			
Introduce new foods along with well-liked familiar foods.	Offer rewards or punishment for eating or not eating.			
Allow children to decide how much to eat. Children require several smaller meals/snacks per day.	Rush children to finish a meal and refuse to offer snacks between meals.			
Use mealtime to strengthen family connectedness while helping children develop good eating habits.	Let children eat alone. Allow distractions such as television.			

Mealtime responsibilities are divided between you and your children. You are in charge of deciding what to eat, when to eat and where to eat. Adults can set the stage for good family nutrition by:

- Choosing and preparing healthy foods
- Providing meals and snacks at routine times
- Creating a pleasant family dining atmosphere
- Role modeling the mealtime behaviors that children must learn

A difficult part of a parent's job can be to trust that children CAN decide how much and whether to eat. When allowed to do so, children will:

- **Eat** (we all have an innate desire to avoid starvation!)
- Eat the amount they need (they will listen to their internal cues for hunger and satiety)
 - Learn to eat what their parents eat
 - Learn to behave well at mealtime

Parents would surely agree that time spent planning meals, modeling good habits and encouraging healthful choices is time well spent!

Aret. As You Shop Fruits and vegetables can fit into any budget. The following tips can help you save money as you strive to eat more fruits and vegetables.

Remember, fresh, frozen, canned, and dried types all count toward getting more fruits and veggies.

Before You Shop

- Look for store ads and use them when planning your weekly grocery list. Plan to buy the fruits and vegetables that are on sale and use them in meals and snacks that week.
- Plan your weekly meals and snacks before you go shopping. Look through your freezer and pantry to see what fruits and vegetables you have at home that you can use.

Think variety! Make a point to try a new fruit or vegetable each week.



After You Shop

Purchase fresh fruits and vegetables in season when they tend to be less expensive.

- **/** Buy whole fruits and vegetables instead of pre-cut or pre-packaged forms which tend to be more expensive.
- **Consider frozen and canned** if fresh are too expensive. Frozen and canned fruits and vegetables keep longer than fresh.
- / Shop smartly! Look out for added sugar in 🤨 canned fruits; look for fruit packed in water or juice. Choose veggies with low sodium.
- / Consider generic or store brands instead of name brands. Store brands tend to cost less and have similar taste and nutrition.
- / If your budget allows, **buy larger bags of frozen** fruits and vegetables. They may be a better bargain and you can use what you need and keep the rest for later use.
- Buy canned or dried beans and use them in recipes instead of meat which is more expensive. Traditional recipes made with meat such as chili, soups, and Mexican dishes like burritos are delicious with beans.

Use fresh fruits and vegetables within a few days after shopping and use frozen and canned fruits and vegetables later in the week.

As you are putting your groceries away, **chop some fruits and vegetables** and place in bags or storage containers. Keep them in the refrigerator so they will be ready to grab for lunches and snacks.

Apples												Choose firm apples with no soft spots.
Avocado												Ripe fruit will be slightly firm, but yield to gentle pressure.
Banana												Select bananas that are firm; with no bruises.
Bell Pepper												Choose peppers with firm skin, with no wrinkles.
Broccoli												Select bunches that are dark green.
Cantaloupe												Select melons that are slightly golden with a light fragrant smell.
Carrots												Pick carrots that are deep orange in color. Avoid carrots that are cracked or wilted.
Corn												Husks should be green, tight, and fresh look- ing. The ear should have tightly packed rows of plump kernels.
Cucumber												Choose firm cucumbers with rich green color and no soft spots.
Eggplant												Pick symmetrical eggplant; avoid oversized eggplants with may be tough and bitter.
Grapes												Look for firm, plump, well-colored clusters.
Lettuce												Choose fresh, crisp leaves with no wilting.
Mushrooms												Mushrooms should be firm, moisture-free (not dry), and blemish-free.
Onion												Onions should feel dry and solid with no soft spots or sprouts.
Orange												Pick oranges that are firm, heavy for their size and have bright colorful skins.
Peach												Choose peaches that are soft to the touch with a fragrant smell.
Pear												Ripe pears will yield slightly to gently pres- sure a the stem end.
Strawberries												Strawberries should be dry, firm and well shaped and be a bright shade of red.
Summer Squash												Look for squash that are firm with bright, glossy exteriors.
Sweet Potato												Choose firm, dark, smooth sweet potatoes.
Tomato												Select plump tomatoes with smooth skins, free
