**T-dap Update**: Most students have met the T-dap requirements. Out of nearly 6,000 7<sup>th</sup> -12<sup>th</sup> grade students in the District, there are only 93 students remaining that have not met the T-dap requirement. A letter was mailed on Friday, October 21, notifying parents/guardians that their child will not be permitted to attend classes beginning Monday, October 24 unless the necessary Tdap documentation or a signed exemption form is provided to the health office. The District auto-dialer was also used to communicate this message. **Total Number of non-compliant students as of Thursday, October 20, 2011: 93.**

**District Advisory Council:** The District Advisory Council (DAC) met on September 29. There are two classified representatives, a teacher representative from each school and administration representation. The main purpose of the DAC is to provide a forum for open two-way communication between the district and school sites. The next meeting is scheduled for November 17, 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Chico Masonic Hall. Please let your school site representative know if there are issues you feel should be discussed at a DAC level.

Compliance Review: CUSD is continuing to prepare for a Federal Program Monitoring (FPM) visit in mid-November. The purpose of the visit is to ensure that we are in compliance with federal regulations that govern the programs for which we receive funding. Educational Services staff has been working to collect and upload documents relating to education for English learners, career-technical education, after-school programs, and Title I, among many other areas. Career-technical education staff at CHS and PVHS has also helped collect copious amounts of data related to their programs. Preparation for this review, like preparation for WASC accreditation, is a time-consuming process. But also as with the WASC, the process of self-study is valuable, and ensures not only that we are in compliance with regulations, but that we are best meeting the needs of our students.

**Oakdale WASC:** Congratulations to Oakdale staff for completing and submitting their initial school visit documents to the WASC accreditation commission. Oakdale staff hopes for a WASC visit this fall.

Healthy Start Report: Congratulations to Tim Cariss, new coordinator of McManus' Healthy Start Program. Recently hired for this position (when former coordinator Andrea Moseley was hired as a principal in Paradise), one of Tim's first accomplishments was to write and submit the annual Healthy Start sustainability report, required for continued funding. While Andrea had written a substantial portion before she left, Tim got a good immersion into the details of the Healthy Start program. Congratulations, Tim, on your new position and on a timely submission!

California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE): CAHSEE results may be found at California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) Results. The high school exit exam will be held on November 1 and 2, 2011, for grade 11 and 12 students and adults who have not yet passed the exam.

**CELDT Testing:** The California English Language Development Test (CELDT) is given each year to students identified as English learners during July through October. Our CELDT examiners are busy finishing up annual CELDT testing by the end of October. The CELDT has three purposes: 1) to identify students who are limited English proficient; 2) to determine the level of English language proficiency of students who are limited English proficient; and 3) to assess the progress of limited English proficient students in acquiring the skills of listening, reading, speaking, and writing in English. **STAR Testing:** Individual student results from the spring 2011 STAR tests have been sent to parent/guardians. If you did not receive your student's STAR score report, please contact Louise Workman at 891-3000, x171. We are currently compiling our STAR orders for 2011-2012. The dates for the STAR Writing Test in grades 4 & 7 will be March 6 and 7, 2012. The STAR multiple-choice testing window will begin on April 16, 2012. **District Assessment:** K-6 teachers are currently assessing students in English and Math skills. Results will be reported to parents on the report cards. The next administration of the District Progress Assessments will take place from October 24 to November 4 for grades 1-6. Students in grades 7-11 will take the District Progress Assessments during the week of November 14–18. Grades 2-11 were assessed in English and Math at the beginning of the school year to establish a baseline for measuring progress in the learning. **Fiscal Services**: Congress has designated October 16-22 as National Save for Retirement Week. Maintenance and Operations (M&O): M&O would like to welcome the addition of our new Transportation Supervisor, Bob Ontiveros. Bob comes to us from First Student Transportation in Yuba City and Dixon locations where he was the Location Manager. Bob worked through the ranks at First Student starting as an A.S.E. Master School Bus Technician, before becoming Shop Manager in Yuba City, then held the position of Director of Maintenance for Northern California. He and his wife have 14 children, 9 of which are adopted foster children. We are pleased to have Bob as a part of our team and look forward to his success.



**Nice Bus!:** The Transportation Department entered a school bus in the Chico Parade of Lights on Friday, October 8. Several schools also had floats in the parade. The event was a huge success and I hope CUSD employees continue their involvement to show off our greatness.

**Nutrition Services:** The Nutrition Services staff is very excited with the results of the new menu roll out at our five Elementary pilot sites: Marigold, Sierra View, Hooker Oak, Chico Country Day, and Shasta. We have had great comments from students and parents and participation is up an average of 40 students daily. We are also excited that three more sites: Citrus, McManus, and Emma Wilson are ready to pilot the new menu starting November 1. By the start of the new year all Elementary sites will have the new five-entrée menu.

#### Top 5 Tips for a Healthy Halloween

- 1. Moderation is Key—You can allow your children to eat candy on occasion but teach them that it is a special treat and not a daily treat. Have a healthy meal before going trick-ortreating so that kids do not end up eating candy because they are hungry. When it comes to Halloween, limit candy to no more than one piece for each hour they are trick-or-treating and one when they get home. Be sure to examine candy carefully before eating. Throw away the candy they do not like and any food items that are not pre-packaged for safety. This helps reduce the temptation of eating candy they really do not enjoy. Take the rest of the candy and put it out-of-reach. Allow a piece for a special treat but do not use it as a reward for good behavior.
- 2. Let Kids Choose—Let your child choose what they want to eat and give them the power to feel in control of what goes into their body. Have them shoot baskets with the candy they do not like right into the trash can.

CUT TO THE CHASE

- 3. Only Buy What You Need—If you live in a popular trick-or-treat area, only buy what you think you will use. Never purchase extra candy for the house stash—you will have plenty of candy after trick-or-treating.
- 4. Mix it Up—Kids enjoy candy, but it is not the only option when trick-or-treating. Try something different such as pre-packaged yogurt covered raisins, pencils, stickers or toys.
- 5. Stay Active-Plan on parking farther away from your destination.

  Walking is a physical activity that can burn those empty candy calories. But remember safety first and bring a flashlight.

**Trick or Treat?** Halloween is a time to celebrate with good friends, costumes and trick-ortreating. Though it is a wonderful and fun holiday, all the treats and candy may make it hard to stay healthy. It is important to allow your kids to trick-or-treat, but you may want to set some limits ahead of time.

#### Halloween Health at School

- Do not let a party be an excuse for poor food choices in the classroom.
- Choose alternative food choices that do not involve fatty foods or candy, such as seasonal vegetables.
- · Get candy out of the classroom and out of mind.


#### Information Technology

**Secondary Teachers' Gradebook Tip:** Remember to back up your Gradebooks. If you ever make a mistake and need to go back to a previous point in your Gradebooks, the only way to do so is from a backup YOU have created. In **Gradebook Maintenance** – Click **Backups** and follow the simple steps. Backup as frequently as you like. Restoring is just as easy (please backup before restoring)!

#### **NEWS FROM HUMAN RESOURCES:**

#### **Negotiations Update**

**CUTA:** The single item before the teams has been the impact and effects of the changes to the Red Plan resulting from the changes imposed by the Butte County JPA. The two bargaining teams met on October 14 to look at possible solutions prior to mediation which was scheduled for October 18. On October 14 the teams exchanged proposals and agreed to continue the process in mediation. The teams met on October 18 in mediation and after a long day reached a tentative agreement (TA). That TA will go through the process with CUTA for ratification by the membership and will likely come to this Board for consideration on November 16<sup>th</sup>.

**CSEA, Chapter 110:** The District and CSEA, Chapter 110 negotiations teams met for a full day on October 11. The Chapter put together a package of proposed changes on which the teams have been collaboratively working. This included topics such as; layoffs, increase in hours for 1:1 instructional assistants, assigning issues for transportation special education aides, disciplinary procedures, evaluation procedures and personal necessity leave. A great deal of progress was made in developing language that both parties could tentatively agree. Conceptual agreement was reached on some issues and we are very close on others. There are some issues that are not yet resolved but the teams continue to work well together and most importantly, continue to listen so that an understanding of the other's point of view can be achieved. The teams will next meet on October 31.

#### **Classified Human Resources**

Recruitments and Eligibility for Open Positions: If you are a current employee and are interested in a position outside of the classification that you are currently working, you must be on the Eligible list of the classification in which you are interested. The normal process for getting onto an Eligible list is to wait until the Classified Human Resources Department conducts a recruitment. Recruitments usually consist of a written exam, then an oral exam, followed by a final selection interview. If the employee passes the initial written and oral exam they are placed onto the Eligible list. If you are in the top three ranks of the Eligible list, you can be considered, following the order of offers, for any openings within the classification. All eligibility lists normally expire after six months so we are constantly recruiting and establishing new lists. An exception to this for current employees is when the position is a lateral position and then you must demonstrate competency which is normally achieved by taking the written examination for the classified position.

**Internal openings** are only open to current CUSD permanent classified employees. If you are interested in any internal openings, you must submit a Letter of Interest. Letter of Interest forms can be found at chicousd.org or you may simply submit a hand-written letter to the Classified Human Resources office that includes the information requested on the Lateral Transfer notice.
