We had tremendous community leadership with the Bond Extension Measure as we all recognized that our students deserve better than what the State is currently providing for the building and maintenance of facilities. The passage of Measure E demonstrates our community's concern for and support of Chico's students. Thank you Chico and we encourage you to visit our website to follow progress as we begin the process for identifying Measure E projects.

Superintendent's Awards for October: Chuck Sheley and Randy Gilzean were the recipients of the October 2012 Superintendent's Award. Chuck Sheley has been involved with CUSD for the last 50 years (yes, he started very young). Mr. Sheley taught for 38 years at Chico Junior and was the Athletic Director for much of that time. His impact has also been felt at Chico High where he has been involved with the Chico High Track program for most of the last 50 years. Mr. Sheley has filled many roles within CUSD and put considerable time and energy into the CUSD Athletic Accountability Plan which is now in its second year of implementation. Most recently, Mr. Sheley has done extensive work with the coach's certification program. He has voluntarily taken on the task of developing a data base that clearly lists all of the certifications of our coaches and streamlines the ability to update information. This is being considered as a model by state athletic leaders. One can hardly mention Chuck Sheley without also mentioning Randy Gilzean. Mr. Gilzean has been a coach at both Chico High School and Pleasant Valley High School, where he also served as Athletic Director. He is very active in the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) on a statewide level and his knowledge and expertise have had an extremely positive impact on CUSD. Mr. Gilzean also helped to draft the CUSD Athletic Accountability Plan and has been instrumental in helping implement the plan. He has held countless coaches' trainings and is helping to monitor CUSD Compliance with the Coach's Certification program as well as Title IX. Thank you to both of these gentlemen for giving so extensively to our district!

NEWS FROM EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

US News and World Report: Chico High is ranked nationally and statewide very favorably in US News and World Report. See: http://www.usnews.com/education/best-high-schools/california/districts/chico-unified-school-district/chico-high-school-1948. Ranking is based on many things but test scores used are from the 2009/10 year. Only other schools near here to make the cut included University Prep in Redding, Chester, and Whitney in the Roseville area. Most of the top 100 are satellite schools like U Prep or Lowell in San Francisco or schools from affluent areas like Scripps Ranch in San Diego, Gunn in Palo Alto, or Redwood in Marin County.

US News and World Report recently informed CHS that they were recognized as a **Silver Award** winner for **Best High Schools in America**. They were ranked #1192 out of 21,776 high schools (top 5%)! Gold Medal winners were the top 2% and the next 7% were Silver Award winners. We were ranked #241 out of 2407 California High Schools (top 10%). One of the major factors that elevated our rankings was the *College Readiness Index* which measures the number of students taking AP exams and our high passing rate. The numbers quoted by US News and World Report indicate the following numbers for AP coursework at CHS:

- Participation Rate 33%
- Participant Pass Rate 81%
- Exams per Test Taker 2.9

Jim Hanlon, Principal stated that even though most the teachers do not teach AP courses, they <u>all</u> contribute by providing rigorous academic instruction to prepare as many students as possible to perform at the AP level. CHS has seen the numbers of students taking AP level coursework triple over the past five to six years. They have set the bar high and each year more and more students are challenging themselves to meet this high mark. This is a team effort! Congratulations to all of you!

Kindergarten Registration will begin the week of December 10, 2012. If you have a child, or know of a child in the Chico Unified School District that will be five on or before October 1, 2013, then that child can be enrolled into Kindergarten. Children who will turn five between October 2, 2013, and December 2, 2013, will be eligible for our Transitional Kindergarten program. Please bring your child's birth certificate, immunization record, and two forms of verification of your address with you when you register at your neighborhood school.

CUSD held its Annual Kindergarten Faire on November 28, 2012, at the Elk's Lodge on Manzanita Avenue. The event was put on by our amazing staff of Kindergarten teachers and Elementary principals. Denee Coultas, a CARD representative was also available as well as Todd Merrill, the local representative from Ident-a-Child. Volunteers from the Parents as Teachers CUSD team were also there to share information with families. Attendees had an opportunity to meet school Principals and Kindergarten Teachers as well as find out everything they need to know about Kindergarten registration. CSUC Kindergarten Faire: The Associated Students Child Development Lab at California State University sponsored a Kindergarten Faire on Wednesday, November 18 from 5:30-7:00 p.m. in the BMU. Chico Unified School District was well represented with tables for each of the elementary schools that are schools of choice plus a table with neighborhood information. More than 12 Kindergarten teachers and numerous administrators were present to talk with interested parents and answer questions. There was a great deal of curiosity regarding the CUSD programs as the schools each had very attractive displays that certainly invited parent interest. Kudos to the staff for their efforts showcasing all the great things happening in CUSD.







Notice of Intent to Apply for Grant Funding: The Chico Unified School District is planning to apply for two after-school grants through the 21st Century Community Learning Centers program: an After-School Safety and Enrichment for Teens (ASSETs) grant for Chico High, Fair View, and Pleasant Valley, and a 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC) grant for Marsh. Currently, 21st CCLC grants are in operation at five elementary schools: Rosedale, McManus, Chapman, Citrus, and Parkview; a second round of 21st CCLC funding has just been awarded to Bidwell Junior and Chico Junior. ASSETs and 21st CCLC grants are available for schools where 40% of the students receive free and reduced-price meals (at junior high and high school, this may include calculations based on the income of students at feeder schools). Farm-to-School Grant Award: The CUSD is one of 68 national recipients of a Farm-to-School grant through the US Department of Agriculture. According to a USDA press release, "Farm-to-School grants will help schools respond to the growing demand for locally sourced foods and increase market opportunities for producers and food businesses... Grants will be used to support agriculture and nutrition education efforts." The \$44,000 grant is for a year of planning and piloting activities to increase students' awareness of nutrition, and to develop ways to bring more locally sourced produce into our cafeterias on a regular basis. At the end of this year, we hope to apply for a two-year implementation grant to bring our plans to scale.

Avoiding Future Holocausts: Congratulations to the PVHS staff and students for their performance, *Avoiding Future Holocausts*. Those in the audience were moved by the experience (see comments at the end of this Update). The music was beautiful, the readings emotional, the dance moving, the student presentations sincere and heartfelt, and Yisinia herself was heartbreaking in her experiences, yet so confident in our future in the hands of our youth. Thank you Amy Besnard, Linda Elliot, Phil Morgan, and the countless others who made this event happen and for allowing our students to have such a positive experience. There was endless praise from those in the audience, students and adults alike. Excellent job to all involved!! What an outstanding authentic learning activity!

Common Core State Standards: Common Core training continues. Brian Boyer, Danielle Pierce, Jennifer Teague and H.B Calvert attended a full day Math Common Core Training at the Butte County Office of Education. The next Administrator's Common Core State Standards Implementation meeting will be Monday, December 10, from 4:00-7:00 p.m. A team of thirty-eight CUSD administrators and teachers will attend the third meeting of a countywide workshop series about supporting the

implementation of the common core state standards. Adopted in California in August 2010, the K-12 Common Core State Standards were developed through a state-led effort to establish consistent and clear education standards for English language arts and mathematics. The Common Core State Standards have been formally adopted by about 90% of the states. A CUSD Board of Education workshop on the Common Core was held on September 5.

Civil Rights Data Collection: Civil Rights Data is being collected and compiled from each site and the district as required by the US Department of Education. The district collects required information such as enrollment, demographics, school expenditures, discipline, advanced placement, math & science courses, teacher experience and prekindergarten.

Leadership Team: The Leadership Team met on November 15 from 3:30-5:00 p.m. for training on gang awareness, prevention and suppression. Thanks to Sgt. Matt Madden of Chico Police Department and to Principals Pedro Caldera and David McKay for informative presentations.

District Advisory Council (DAC): The next meeting is today, November 29 at the Large Conference Room from 12:30-3:10 p.m. The purposes of the DAC are to provide a forum for open two-way communication between the district and school sites as well as guidance and support for Common Core State Standards implementation. California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE): The next administration of the high school exit exam will be held on February 5 and 6, 2013, for grade 10 students and for grade 12 students and adults who have not yet passed the exam.

CELDT Testing: The annual assessment window concluded on October 31. Thanks to all CELDT coordinators for your work and dedication. The California English Language Development Test (CELDT) test is given each year to students identified as English learners. The CELDT has three purposes: 1) to identify students who are limited English proficient; 2) to determine the level of English language proficiency of students who are limited English proficient; and 3) to assess the progress of limited English proficient students in acquiring the skills of listening, reading, speaking, and writing in English. STAR Test: The dates for the STAR Writing Test in grades 4 & 7 will be March 5 and 6, 2013. The STAR multiple-choice testing window will begin on April 15, 2013. The 2012 STAR test results were released approximately August 31 and may be found at: http://star.cde.ca.gov/

CALPADS: To fully comply with federal accountability requirements, California has enacted a data collection and reporting system, California Longitudinal Pupil Achievement Data System (CALPADS). Collection and reporting of this data is a joint effort between all CUSD schools, Business Services, Educational Services, Human Resources, Information Technology, and Nutrition Services. CALPADS data submission for Fall 1 (12-13 Enrollment Counts, 11-12 Grads and Drops and Immigrant Counts) began October 3rd and goes through mid-December.

NEWS FROM BUSINESS SERVICES

Measure E: First let me start out my thanking the entire Chico Community and Staff for supporting our Measure E school improvement measure. The measure passed with an overwhelming show of support. So what now? We start planning immediately. Below is the Draft Measure E Scope of Work Implementations Plan:

<u>DRAFT</u> Chico Unified School District 2012 Measure E Scope of Work Implementation Plan

Create Citizens Oversight Committee: The district has 60 days from the date the Board certifies the elections results to establish a Citizen Oversight Committee. Election results will not be finalized by Butte County until late November, early December. It is recommended the Board certify election results at the regular January 2013 meeting. In the interim, the district will, beginning the week of November 19, advertise in printed media and the district website, participation in the committee including roles and responsibilities. The Board will select committee members after the January 2013 meeting. Per Education Code Section 152789(a), the committee shall consist of at least seven (7) members to serve a two year term, without compensation. The members must include one member who is active in a business organization representing the business community, a member active in a senior citizen's organization, one member from a bona fide taxpayer association, one member shall be a parent or guardian of a student enrolled in the district, and one parent or guardian of a student in the district who is also active in a parent-teacher organization.

Preplanning Sequence of Work:

- 1. Create a Measure E button on district website to publish all working documents as developed.
- 2. Each school site to begin working with staff, students, parents and community members to develop an individual site scope of work priority list. (Bond objectives and common directions sent to sites after November 14, 2012, meeting.)
- 3. M&O, Facilities, and IT staff work to prioritize existing work matrix.
- 4. F&P staff to develop detailed scope of work at each site.
- 5. Estimate cost of scope of work for each site, organized by categories (Deferred maintenance, new construction, technology, etc.)
- 6. Bring site lists back to sites for review
- 7. Community forum to solicit input on scope of work
- 8. Bring site lists to Board for input/review and prioritization
- 9. Develop a Master Schedule of work to be done based on prioritization
- 10. Bring the draft Master Schedule to Board for public input
- 11. Review with Board all available funding sources including Measure E
 - a. At this time the Fiscal timelines of Bond Issuance will be presented
- 12. Board adopt Committee policies, guidelines, and procedures

- 13. Board appoints Citizen's Oversight Committee
- 14. Community forums to solicit input on Master Schedule
- 15. Review draft Master Schedule with Citizen's Oversight Committee
- 16. Draft Master Plan presented to Board (on agenda for two meetings)
- 17. Final Master Plan approved by Board
- 18. Board presentation on Financing and Bond Issuance options
- 19. Phase I approved by Board

Proposition 30: Another critical success to Education in the November 6 elections was the passage of Proposition 30. This action prevented more than \$5 million dollars in reduction to CUSD revenues in the current fiscal year, next year and after. What does this mean for CUSD now? The current estimated revenues per student built in the Budget adopted by the board in June stands. However, we are still deficit spending. Our Revenues are still at levels received in 2007-08. The hope now is that with the slowing improving economy, State revenues will continue to inch up and provide no further reduction to education funding. Some good news is that CUSD enrollment is up for the first time in many years. This will be reflected in the First Interim financial report brought to the Board on December 5.

Both Measure E and Proposition 30 were victories for CUSD. Thank you again for all your support in the success of both.

Other Business Office News: The Finance Department has been working diligently to bring budgets in line with spending and allocate carryovers to sites. We are also in the process of evaluating all of the business practices and updating them to current best practices to become more efficient and simplify processes for sites. With the new Escape software, sites now have instant access to accounts and financial data. Staff has begun creating small work groups working collaboratively with site staff in the evaluation and recommendation of updated processes. Thank you all who have offered to participate in the process.

NEWS FROM MAINTENANCE & OPERATIONS / FACILITIES / NUTRITION SERVICES

Thank you from M&O: A couple of things to be Thankful for are the passage of Proposition 30 and Measure E. We at M&O look forward to the opportunity presented with the passing of Measure E. Over the next few years we hope to be able to make great improvements at school sites such as replacing old HVAC units, new roofs, carpeting, improving energy efficiency, and improving bathrooms, to name just a few. We will be working closely with the District Office and begin implementing improvements as soon as approved.

Weather Changes: Now that the cold weather is starting to settle in, here are some tips and precautions:

- Use care when opening doors. The wind can catch them and fling them open unexpectedly.
- Keep your rooms closed up as much as possible to allow the heater to work properly.
- Watch for slippery floors and sidewalks. Beware of ice.

Facilities Update: Fair View High School Construction Technology Shop: With the foundation and wood framing complete, the roof of the new Construction Technology Shop was added this past week. Now that the building is sheltered from inclement weather, work on the interior can get started. The steel erection for the outdoor covered workspace is well underway.

Inspire School of Arts & Sciences on the Chico High Campus: On November 15 the Facilities Department received Statements of Qualifications (SOQ's) from potential Lease-Leaseback Contractors for the addition of portable classrooms for the Inspire High Campus. Selected qualified construction companies were interviewed by a committee on November 27, 2012.

Chico High School Lincoln Hall & Fitness Laboratory: The foundation for the gymnasium portion of the new Lincoln Hall was poured on Friday, November 9. Form framing for the concrete tilt-up walls is now occurring. Pleasant Valley High School New Classroom Building: The construction of the two-story, twenty-four classroom building is moving along on the Pleasant Valley High School campus. NEWS FROM HUMAN RESOURCES

Kindergarten TV Ads: Beginning Monday, December 3 and continuing for two to three months a series of 30-second television ads will begin airing on Channels 12, 24 and CW10. These ads feature many of our great kindergarten teachers telling our community the great things that happen EVERYDAY in their classes. These will shine the light on our incredible kindergarten classes and our amazing kindergarten teachers. Kindergarten registration begins on December 10. We will have the ads on our website as soon as they are completed. Thanks to our creative, poised, and star-quality kindergarten teachers for allowing CUSD to be where they started their career in film.

Negotiations CSEA, Chapter 110: On November 13 CSEA, Chapter 110 ratified a tentative agreement (TA) that dealt with almost all articles in the collective bargaining agreement (CBA) between the Chapter and the District. The Board of Education ratified this same TA. The agreement is now in effect until November 2015. Both parties can still reopen the articles dealing with wages and health and welfare benefits and one more each during each of the next three years including the current year. This was a long and complicated process given that the entire CBA was open for discussion. This agreement was possible due to the patience, persistence, cooperation and commitment of the members of both bargaining teams. From the District's perspective, is was a pleasure to work with the Chapter's team.

Negotiations Chico Unified Teachers' Association (CUTA): The CUTA and District negotiating teams exchanged package proposals this summer. The teams met on September 6 and 13 to discuss those proposals. On October 9 CTA/CUTA filled a "Request for Impasse Determination/Appointment of Mediator" with the Public Employment Relations Board (PERB). The District did not join CTA/CUTA in this filing. The District believes that this filing was premature. We did make it clear to PERB that we would work cooperatively with the mediator assigned to us. Mediation is scheduled for Thursday, December 6.

Donors Choose: DonorsChoose.org is an online charity that makes it easy to connect local communities to the needs of students in public schools. Educators submit classroom project requests for materials and experiences that students need to learn. Community members can browse project requests, contribute any amount and learn about the project's status through photos and thank you messages. Beginning November 1, PG&E provided a Double Your Impact offer to match 50 percent of funding needs of classroom projects across our county, up to \$25,000.

We encourage teachers to post their requests on the website and for community members to help support such requests through **DonorsChoose.org**. Once you are there, go to "projects" on the top and then select the state and city you want. You will see the teacher projects that have been set up. When you donate, PG&E will match your donation up to \$25,000 in Butte County. This is a great way to help our schools and our students. Enloe, Butte County EMS train Chico High School in CPR, first aid

CHICO, Calif., Nov. 26, 2012 – Enloe Medical Center and Butte County EMS have teamed up to provide free CPR and first aid training to Chico High School students and staff in October and November. The program is part of Vallarie Jensen's 9th through 12th grade health classes, recently updated with a more relevant, hands-on curriculum. Chico High administration encouraged Jensen's efforts to provide CPR and first aid training to not only students, but also staff. Upon completion of training, each participant will receive CPR and First Aid cards.

Training kicked off with a two-day First Aid class for 246 students in October. Emergency medical technicians (EMTs) and paramedics from Butte County EMS rotated through Jensen's classroom, covering topics such as splinting, controlling bleeding, treatment for head, neck and back injuries, assessing a victim, and how to call 911. Jensen said the ambulance crews had a "commendable attitude and the kids enjoyed it [the class] immensely."

On Oct. 24, Nov. 5 and Nov. 7 faculty and staff attended a 3.5-hour American Heart Association Heartsaver CPR evening class. Cindy Weaver, RN, from Enloe's Education Center taught the class at the Enloe Conference Center, with 41 CHS staff members attending over the three days. The Heartsaver CPR class is designed for the layperson and teaches how to provide CPR to all ages, how to relieve choking, and how to use an automated external defibrillator (AED), which is a portable electronic device that automatically diagnoses and treats potentially life threatening cardiac arrhythmias. Training was given on the same Zoll-brand AED that is at Chico High School. Enloe provided the classes at no cost.

Students will receive the Heartsaver CPR training at Chico High on Nov. 26 and Nov. 27 from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Thirty-five to 50 students per hour will rotate through the class in Chico High's new Student Commons Area. Weaver, as well as paramedics and EMTs from Butte County EMS, all certified Basic Life Support instructors, will teach the classes. Each student who completes the two-day CPR course in November and the First Aid training in October has the opportunity to purchase a First Aid and CPR card through Butte County EMS, which will provide the training at no charge. Butte County EMS is a joint venture between Enloe Emergency Services and First Responder EMS Inc.

"Enloe and Butte County EMS have been absolutely wonderful in helping me educate my students," Jensen said. "I have always felt that health classes should be hands on for students to appreciate making the right choices for their own health." Her students have also recently researched health-related topics in the local and national news, such as alcohol poisoning and the meningitis outbreak, and they have explored health care careers and relevant medical issues. On Nov. 6, students received an introduction to emergency services as a career, interacting with Enloe FlightCare paramedics Kira Simon and Jim Cuneo and Emergency Room Triage Technician Teri DuBose, and receiving a tour of an ambulance. "The students appreciated learning how emergency care happens and how ambulances and the helicopter respond," Jensen said.

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

What did the last 24 hours mean to you?

- "Yesterday changed my life. I know it sounds corny, but it really did. I used to think there wasn't anything
 people could do to stop these atrocities, but now I realize just how much difference even one person can
 make."
- "My favorite part of last night was all of the presentations. The night meant a lot to me because that was probably the only time I will ever meet a Holocaust survivor."
- "Meeting Yanina and hearing what she went through from her was unbelievable. It puts so much in perspective how happy she is even after the atrocities she's seen and been through is admirable. She is so strong!"
- "The last 24 hours meant a lot to me. I learned a good amount of things about all of the past genocides."
- "Last night was a great night for the recognition of all the world's genocides. Yanina is by far the strongest and funniest woman I have met. Her bravery far succeeds her frail appearance. Last night will go down in PV history."
- "Being able to meet an actual Holocaust survivor was a very special experience. It was definitely a once in a lifetime opportunity. I really appreciated the purpose of the night and I'm glad I got the chance to be a part of it."
- "I enjoyed the performance. All was perfect and I think it joined us to do a good thing for the public. The art, music, and dance were awesome."
- "I felt that it gave a new point of view on life. It was such a fun event and I enjoyed it. It gave me a new outlook on life and made me realize even the slightest racist jokes are not okay. Thank you for the great opportunity to be a part of something great."
- "Last night meant to me that I became a part of a big event to help a problem in the world. It felt great to
 meet Yanina and hear her story because it was a once in a lifetime experience. I will remember last night
 for the rest of my life."
- "The last couple of days meant a lot to me. It was great to meet Yanina and hear her tell her story."
- "Avoiding Future Holocausts: A Night to Remember was an event that I will always remember. Emceeing
 the event helped to give me a chance to further work on my goal. My pledge wasn't just for that event. It is
 my life goal to make a change that will stand the test of time."
- "When Yanina came and talked to us in class, she was so funny. I wish I could keep her in my pocket and her out when I need a laugh or inspiration. The event and Yanina was a life changing experience. I would give anything to experience that again."
- "The last few days have been amazing and eye-opening. I'm very thankful to meet Yanina and be a part of this event. I have a deeper understanding about Holocausts. Thank you."
- "Being able to hear Yanina speak was extremely interesting. Reading about the Holocaust in books gives someone an idea of what happened is one thing, but hearing someone speak who was actually there completely opens your eyes."
- "It was a really interesting experience and one that I will never forget."
- "This night meant so much because I personally got to hear Yanina's story, not just read about it, but her telling us. It felt so real."
- "Yesterday I realized nothing is being done about genocides."
- "What it meant for me to meet Yanina was a once in a lifetime experience. Only a few people get to say that what she said was amazing. I know for a fact my children are not going to be able to get this opportunity to meet a Holocaust survivor. It meant a lot."
- "It opened my mind to the world of genocide and the events that still go on today. It brought more genocide awareness to my daily life and helped me greatly to appreciate what I have in America."
- "The event opened my eyes to the truth of how cruel people can be towards others."
- "It was amazing how a Holocaust survivor could overcome and speak to us."
- "She made me feel happy. She was so nice and understanding. I loved how funny she was and how she has so much spirit even though she was in the Holocaust. It didn't even feel real. It was a chance of a lifetime and I hope I get to meet her again."
- "It meant a lot to me because it made me realize how big of a problem genocide is."
- "I was touched. I felt like it was worth the effort we all put in to it and then some more."
- "This was a life changing experience and this was the first time I have gotten up in front of a big audience."

- "Meeting Yanina really meant a lot. I really felt something and learned not to judge people for dumb reasons. I've been sticking up for people who are saying mean things to people and that's not something I would do. I really, really, really think we should do more things to this. It taught me to be a better person."
- "I've really liked this whole Holocaust unit. It's something that actually caught my full attention and I enjoyed being a part of it. It actually made me talk to people about what I've been doing in class."
- "It meant a lot to me. It showed me how one person's voice can speak louder, if it has meaning, than 100 voices without. Getting the privilege to actually meet that wonderful woman leaves me forever grateful."
- "Being able to meet a Holocaust survivor was pretty cool. She was pretty cool and nice."
- "The Holocaust event changed my views on people and the way I treat them because you just never know. You never know what someone has gone through or their story."
- "It meant so much to me to be able to make everyone aware of what's going on around us. Yanina's story touched me. She was a great treat."
- "The last few days have meant hard work and determination that, in the end, was worth it."
- "It's empowering to imagine that Yanina survived all of that and stayed strong. It helps me. I can use her life as an example when I'm going through a hard time. She went through so much. I know that I couldn't do it on my own like she did."
- "Her story made me realize how lucky I am to be able to do whatever I was and not get severely punished for it. It makes me be very thankful for the life I have."
- "It opened my eyes to see how much more horrible the Holocaust really was than I thought it was before hearing her stories. It showed me not to take most things for granted."
- "It meant a lot. It was great to meet her and to hear her story. She's just so cute! I'd adopt her if I can. She's a huge inspiration."
- "I can speak in front of a group of people and do an okay job at it. Being nervous is natural and I thought I held it down well."
- "It was an amazing experience to see and meet Yanina. To see one of the few Holocaust survivors was great."
- "It meant a lot to me to meet Yanina because I was so inspired by everything Yanina told us. I was so honored to be a part of something so amazing. I was very thankful that I was able to be a part of the Holocaust event."

- "I thought that it was really cool to meet Yanina. She was really funny and outgoing. I really liked all the projects and work everyone did. It was so awesome last night."
- "It was a special day. I learned new stuff that I wanted to know about. I actually learned more about the Holocaust and what it was like."
- "I am really surprised by how wonderful the show was. I knew if we worked hard and tried our best, we would have more opportunities to be successful. I also realized that I am not worse than others."
- "To meet Yanina inspired me. I can't believe how much she has been through and she's still standing tall. Much love to her."
- "It meant a lot to me to see and hear how much Yanina went through. It's amazing."
- "Seeing Yanina meant that I got to talk to a historical person who survived the Holocaust and a great dancer."
- "It meant a lot to meet Yanina, to hear her story. I'm glad I got to hear for myself from a personal experience. It seems unreal that people can be so cruel. All humans should be treated equal. I really wish people could have put a stop to the Holocaust earlier. So many people are gone now. It's so sad. Bless Yanina's heart."
- "To me it meant to have a chance to hear from someone's experience. To meet her was incredible. It meant a lot to me and I will cherish that moment forever. It changed me. It was sad, but it was life changing."

Dear Kelly;

The Board of Trustees of the Paradise Unified School District and I want to thank you for your extraordinary support of our students and staff in the aftermath of the recent automobile accident that tragically took the lives of two of our young people. Your compassion provided comfort for all those trying to cope with loss and the traumatic experiences of the driver and young people at the accident scene. Your immediate offer to provide support as you stepped away from schedules that were already very demanding and challenging is greatly appreciated. Your presence and assistance were critical. Together, county agencies and school districts along with the faith-based community, we were able to begin the long and difficult healing process.

Your efforts were part of an amazing community response over the course of the last week. It started with a 1000 person candle light vigil at the accident scene, followed by your support at three of our schools. There were continuing activities at our schools throughout the week and meetings with Butte County Office of Education and Butte County Behavioral Health to address the needs of students with the most significant challenges. While the struggle to cope with the loss will intensify for many, with your help, we have begun the long process of healing.



How Can Schools And Parents Protect Children From Bullying?



arents of school-aged children are becoming increasingly aware of the number of incidents of bullying that occur both at school and on-line. Children may avoid admitting they are targets of bullying, so it's important for parents to be aware of the different signs children show that may indicate that they've been the victims of bullying.

Christa Melnyk Hines notes in her article, Talking About Bullying; Could your chatterbox's talking be hiding a bigger problem?, that children may not tell about bullying if they are feeling embarrassed or ashamed. Parents need to look for signs which can include a sudden change in disposition, ailments like stomachaches and headaches, anxiety about going to school or riding the bus, falling grades, or, in extreme cases, self-abuse such as cutting.

It can be difficult to get a child to open up about a bullying incident, so it's important to keep the lines of communication open with your child, asking him about school and friendships, asking if he knows kids who are bullied, or telling him about a time when you experienced bullying.

Marriage and Family Therapist Mike Pautz of Mount Shasta teaches parents and children that bullying is about power and control. Pautz says, "Bullies often times do not have any power or control within their home, so they use bullying as a way to gain this back. Bullies use bullying as a way to gain back power they may

have lost in their personal lives. They do this by threats, name-calling, and putting others down."

Teasing, social bullying (such as excluding someone from a group), spreading rumors, and physical bullying are other types of bullying. Since bullying can also occur on Facebook and by text messaging, parents need to try to monitor their child's use of electronic media since online bullying is a serious problem and can carry over into school.

If your child shares with you a bullying incident that occurred at school, discuss ways your child can deal with the situation and how he can protect himself. Your child needs to know that he isn't alone, that other kids have also had the same experiences, and that bullying is not acceptable behavior.

Hines suggests the following to share with your child to help avoid a bullying situation:

Tell the bully to stop and then walk away from the

- Tell the bully to stop and then walk away from the situation as soon as you can.
- Practice remaining unemotional by ignoring him or assuming a "straight face" since a bully generally seeks a reaction.
- Hang out with friends to avoid being alone. If you don't have friends nearby, try to stay close to other people.
- Tell a teacher, school counselor, parent, another trusted adult, a friend, or a sibling.

Marsh Junior High School in Chico has developed a peer mediation program, which consists of 15 peer mediators from the 8th grade, to mediate bullying incidents at school. Parents need to be aware that children, particularly adolescents and teens, may feel more secure talking to a peer about bullying rather than an adult, since some children have strong bonds with their peers and they feel that their peers can better relate to their problems.

At the beginning of the year, Marsh students are given a Bully Hotline card with a hotline email and phone number to report being bullied or a bullying incident they witnessed. Mediators then try to bring both sides together to "talk it out" to determine whether it was a bullying incident or a misunderstanding, and to help resolve the situation. Having a friend or bystander who witnesses an incident stand up for the victim and report it is very important to ending the bullying cycle. Peer mediator at Marsh

Ryland Jolliffe remarks, "We need to empower the bystanders to be upstanders."

The start of a new school year is a particularly difficult time for students, especially 7th graders since they are trying to find where they fit in at a new school. The peer mediators at Marsh stated that at the beginning of the school year they started receiving calls the first week of classes. In addition to assisting students by phone or in mediation, the peer mediators visit classrooms to give presentations and also show the documentary: Let's Get Real.

Cyberbullying is also a big problem for students at this age. According to Sameer Hinduja, Ph.D. and Justin W. Patchin, Ph.D., experts in cyberbullying, some things parents and students themselves can do to help prevent this type of bullying are: never open unidentified or unsolicited messages, protect your passwords, keep photos PG on Facebook and other social media, log off of online accounts, set up privacy controls, google yourself to find out what personal information is public, and don't be a cyberbully yourself.

Parents need to be aware of the symptoms of bullying, encourage children to talk about what is going on at school and with peers, offer support and guidance when needed, and demonstrate how to confidently manage the many diverse personalities who will inevitably come in and out of the child's life. Preventing children from bullying needs to be an ongoing effort made by parents, teachers and children themselves.
