The Superintendent's Update

INFORMATION REGARDING NEGOTIATIONS

Currently the District has offered funding that amounts to a 2% salary increase to both CUTA and CSEA 110. Those funds can be used as each group determines. In addition, the District has proposed increasing its payment for medical insurance premiums from the \$950 paid in 2013/14 to \$985 for 2014/15.

Under the new Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), some of the state money that was previously known as "categorical" or "restricted" dollars is now "unrestricted". While that could have provided increased flexibility in how local districts use dollars, the State at the same time required all districts to develop a Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) to demonstrate how it will spend monies on targeted students, specifically low socio-economic, English learners, and foster youth.

Further adding to the issue is the fact that K-12 districts, most definitely including Chico Unified School District, have not yet recovered from the huge cuts to public education that were incurred with the recession that began in 2007-08. In fact, the unrestricted LCFF funding that CUSD will receive from the State for the current 2014-2015 school year will be slightly *less than we received in the 2007-08* school year. As all costs continue to rise, it is not a surprise that the District's budget for 2014-15 shows that we are spending more money than we bring in.

To help address needs across the District with limited dollars, the Board has taken the approach of allocating approximately one-third of new money toward each of the following priorities:

- Employee compensation
- Programs for students, with an emphasis on the targeted student populations
- Deficit reduction

In regards to CUTA, the District and CUTA bargaining teams last met on May 29. The District requested a postponement of the session scheduled for August 11. CUTA declined the opportunity to reschedule and responded that CUTA would file with the Public Employment Relations Board (PERB) for a declaration of impasse. The District has requested that further negotiations sessions be scheduled.

In regards to CSEA, Chapter 110, the negotiating teams met on September 23 and reached agreement on a memorandum of understanding that spells out the process and forms to be used to have many CSEA 110 members paid on an annualized basis and moves us away from time cards.

We look forward to the opportunity for additional negotiations sessions with our employee groups in the near future. It is our goal to find positive resolutions that address the three priorities of our Board and community—employee compensation, student programs, and a balanced budget.

NEWS FROM EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

District Wide Meeting: The second of four District Wide staff development meetings is scheduled for October 14. Elementary teachers will be discussing Reading strategies for struggling readers and will be grouped by grade levels. Secondary Teachers and Counselors around the district will sign up utilizing the staff development Google calendar in the staff room on the CUSD website. The secondary menu includes some department specific sessions, sessions related to Smarter Balanced Assessment, and some general professional development titles like *Nurtured Heart* and *Google Applications for Education*. The majority of these sessions are being facilitated by Chico Unified School District staff.

Secondary Math Update: Secondary Math teachers met during the District Wide meetings on September 16, 2014, to discuss different acceleration models that could be implemented next year. Acceleration models had entry points that ranged from 7th to 11th grade. The overall consensus was to accelerate sooner rather than later, but some are hesitant to accelerate in 7th grade because of past experience with improper placement. Due to the implementation of Common Core Curriculum the current 8th graders have not yet been given the opportunity to accelerate. Our first priority is to create a model for this group of students to begin acceleration in 2015-16 that will give them the opportunity to take AP Calculus by their senior year. The next priority is to create a model that would accelerate junior high students allowing them to also reach AP Calculus by their senior year. A final decision on acceleration for this year's 8th grade class will be made by the November District Wide meeting. We will continue to look at the junior high options and have a decision by early spring. Elementary Lync Meeting: Writing assessment protocol and scoring was the topic of discussion on all elementary sites via a Lync webinar during last Tuesday's staff meeting. Collaborative discussions were held in grade level bands (K/1/2, 3/4 and 5/6) regarding grade level writing content and convention expectations. The narrative writing rubric both in student friendly language and CCSS aligned language was examined and discussed by teacher groups. Additionally, grade level examples of narrative writing were provided for each grade level band to use as they individually scored and then discussed the rubric level of the papers. This information was provided as the Tri 1 Benchmark Writing Assessment window opens up on Monday, October 13 and closes on Friday, October 24.

YouthBuild: Chico Unified is very fortunate to have been awarded a YouthBuild grant. The program is a comprehensive youth and community development program which engages out-of-school, low-income youth ages 16 – 24 and provides an alternative education and employment pathway that enables participants to obtain a high school diploma or GED, advance toward post-secondary education or career-oriented employment. Twelve students who were in the first cohort recently graduated. One student went directly to full-time employment. The other eleven are pursuing post- secondary education. Blaze Jordan, one of the graduates, has been accepted to the Art Institute in Seattle, Washington. He has received approximately \$34,000 in scholarship funds to support him as he furthers his education.

Early Childhood Family Education and Support Program: Did you know that CUSD has an early childhood family education and support program? CUSD Parents as Teachers (PAT) services begin prenatally and continue until a child enters Kindergarten. There are currently three PAT parent educators that make personal visits (either in the home or at our center at Citrus Elementary School). Our parent educators provide information on child development, support for challenges (such as discipline, sleep, eating, etc.) and encouragement! We can serve up to 75 children and can provide services in English, Spanish and Hmong. The only requirement we have is that the family must live in Chico and have a child aged 0-5.

The PAT curriculum is research-based, developmentally appropriate, and helps to build the five protective factors (parental resilience, social connections, knowledge of parenting and child development, concrete supports in times of need, and social and emotional competence of children). We provide developmental screenings (ASQ and ASQ-SE) and vision and hearing screenings yearly.

PAT is a fun program for both the children and the parents. At the personal visits, the parent educator guides the parent and child in a fun activity that is developmentally appropriate. Families are encouraged to set goals and the parent educators help them to determine what steps they must take in order to reach their goals. Families are also referred to outside resources as the need arises. Each PAT child gets a free book at the end of each visit.

CUSD PAT is a fun, non-threatening way for parents to receive assistance and support in strengthening their parenting skills, as well as improving their child's development. Special Education: Aaron Sauberan presented this summer at the National Convention - Special Education Services For Early Childhood Professional Development on June 8, 2014, in Minneapolis, Minnesota. His presentation was entitled: *Teacher Initiated - One School's Changing Approach to Preschool Special Education Paraprofessional Staff Development.* Aaron has established himself as a leader in preschool education. He is actively evaluating the current needs in our districts special education programs and aligning these to teacher professional development workshops. Aaron continues to implement best practices in many of our professional development workshops this year. Two such workshops are noted below from Loma Vista Preschool.

Information Services: Following is a logistics document for the 43 carts and 1,530 additional Chromebooks devices. This brings our total to 45 carts and 1,650 Chromebooks specifically for Instructional Technology. The schools have group numbers indicating all the carts and schools they will be delivering with the group number. The IT staff (Mike Tilton) is working with the company to "drop off" the carts to each school site. He will follow up with proper use of the carts and how the devices will be stored. Also, many of our sites still have limited networking and wireless connectivity. We will continue to work on the school sites with the QuickStart projects. Sierra View, Hooker Oak and Little Chico Creek will have a new network (including wireless) Infrastucture. We are beginning the next three sites as well as addressing the remaining sites to improve network and wireless connectivity.

Update on Chromebook Carts: The delivery of the chromebook carts to each of the sites has been completed. There is another step by which the devices need to be configured to work with WiFi networks. As has been stated in the past, depending on the wireless equipment and coverage, the device experience may vary greatly. We have upgraded wireless at the following sites: Pleasant Valley High, Chico High, Sierra View, Hooker Oak, and Little Chico Creek. We will have more information about wireless upgrades and schedules soon for the remaining sites. We are confident in the wireless capabilities at the sites with upgraded wireless. We will start chromebook configurations at these sites first and then move to the remaining sites.

The remaining sites will be configured for legacy wireless but depending on the signal strength and the number of devices connecting in a given area (this includes any laptops, iPads, smartphones, and other devices connected by staff and/or students) the experience may be less than ideal. When there are many devices connecting to the legacy wireless, the experience will be affected. The remaining sites will also start next week. The IT department will be establishing a temporary wireless (SSID) network (i.e., CUSD and CUSD Guest) that will be enabled for a short time to be used to connect/configure the chromebooks on the legacy CUSD wireless network. We will work with each site to complete the chromebook wireless configuration and then each site will need to test the devices for usability.

As a reminder, the chromebooks will remain as "district owned" and each site will be responsible for any broken, damaged and/or lost or stolen devices. We will provide instructions on best practices for device management. The IT department will inventory the carts twice a year to ensure they remain in good working order. I hope this helps to bring everyone up to speed on the deployment and status.

NEWS FROM BUSINESS SERVICES

2013-14 Financial Report: The 2013-14 year-end financial report is complete. The Unaudited Actuals (UA) financial statements are the year-end reports representing the financial activity of the Chico Unified School District (CUSD) for the 2013-14 fiscal year ending June 30, 2014. This report is not a budget with estimates and projections. It presents actual revenues received and expenses incurred during the year.

For 2013-14, CUSD reports a negative change in fund balance in unrestricted programs of (\$4,468,500). The Estimated Actual (EA) Budget projected a negative change in fund balance of (\$4,380,702). The difference between the projection and the actual was \$87,798. This represents a very accurate EA budget projection.

The negative change in fund balance is the third consecutive year of reported deficits in unrestricted programs.

CUSD, like nearly all school districts in California, received one-time federal funds (i.e. American Recovery & Reinvestment Act (ARRA) and Ed Jobs Program) and one-time state funds (i.e. State Fiscal Stabilization Funds (SFSF)) in prior years that increased the district's fund balance. CUSD has been utilizing these one-time dollars to avoid cutting programs during the economic recession. As we come out of the recession, CUSD continues to spend more money than we receive in revenue, even with additional money from LCFF. CUSD will need to reduce expenditures to balance our budget.

Chico High School Lincoln Center Wins Top Design Awards: The Western Council of Construction Consumers has awarded Chico Unified with awards for design and sustainability excellence for Lincoln Hall. School Board President, Dr. Kathleen Kaiser, accepted the award on behalf of the district at an awards banquet held on October 2, 2014. SKW Architects was praised for their innovative building design and Modern Building Company (James Seegert) was honored for facilitating the construction of our beautiful new building. Michael Weissenborn, former Director of Facilities and Construction and Julie Kistle the current Director joined the celebration.



Proposition 39 Expenditure Plan: On Friday, October 3, 2014, the district was notified that the California Energy Commission approved our 2013/14 Energy Expenditure Plan for an amount of \$2,026,504.20! The expenditure plan covers a period of five (5) years starting with 2015. The Facilities Department has begun planning for the first round of projects that will include Exterior/Interior Lighting Improvements at Citrus, Emma Wilson, Hooker Oak, Sierra View, Chico Jr., and Bidwell Jr., Solar at Neal Dow, and partial heating and air conditioning replacements at Bidwell Jr., Chico Jr. and Citrus.

Water Emergency: There are currently nine Cohasset Community households without water because their wells have gone dry. CUSD Maintenance and Operations, in cooperation with the Cohasset Community Association, Butte County Public Health Department, and the Butte County Emergency Services are working together to supply those Cohasset residents with water for their households. The Cohasset Community Association has provided personnel to distribute the water. Mike Witczek, CUSD Sr. Plumber, has trained the volunteers on the proper techniques and procedures to distribute water to the households in need. The Association will distribute the water until the local wells can produce their own water. Special thanks go to:

CHS Agriculture & the Henshaw Farm: The students did a great job growing cranberry beans this year - they yielded 25,000 pounds field weight. This is a very high yield and even more impressive when the growing conditions are taken into consideration. The seeds were germinating in the hottest week of the summer, coming through the soil in 105 degree weather with the soil surface itself at 120 degrees. Thank you to the Friends of Ag for their ongoing support of the farm. Their farming advice during trying conditions ensured positive results at the farm. Thank you also to the Ag instructors for their support of our students.

CHS Welding Students Win Awards: CHS Welding Instructor Ronnie Cockrell took four Welding 2 students and eight Advanced Welding students to a two-day welding event at Shasta College. During the first day, the students had the opportunity to practice MIG and TIG welding as well as classroom sessions on both welding processes. The following day, the students practiced the Oxy-Ace cutting process. The students were presented with a heavily weighted written test about the three different welding processes they had learned. The final activity was a performance exam where students had to perform one of the three processes: MIG. TIG. or Oxy-Ace. Sacramento Valley Scholastic Chess League (SVSCL): Steven Oberlander is not only a teacher at Neal Dow Elementary School in Chico, but he is also the Director of the Sacramento Valley Scholastic Chess League (SVSCL)—and he is encouraging all schools in the district to join in! Fielding teams from as far south as Yuba City and as far north as Corning, this competitive scholastic league has been in existence for over 15 years. A chess team is a positive alternative for those students who may not excel in traditional sports or extra-curricular activities. In order to get a chess team started, simply find one or more students interested in playing the game and one adult willing to supervise and assist the students. Three players are needed to field a school chess team, but if you do not have that many interested players, an individual student may still join the league and participate in our tournaments as an unattached player. Participants in the league can be in any grade K-12. Competitive tournaments occur from 4pm to 5:30p.m. on a Wednesday once a month and are held at different schools. In order to join the SVSCL, each student must complete a league membership form. There is also a \$35 membership fee. This fee provides membership in the league as well as the United States Chess Federation (USCF). This joint SVSCL/USCF membership ensures that each student will have a globally accepted chess ranking based on his/her tournament wins and losses. 



PLAY HARDER


