## NEWS FROM EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

Voluntary Meeting for CUSD Employees: In 2013 California implemented a new formula for funding K-12 public education known as the Local Control Funding Formula or LCFF. The LCFF allocates funding that must be used to provide improved or increased services to English Learner students, students from disadvantaged socio-economic backgrounds and students living in foster homes ("targeted students"). The LCFF requires school districts to craft a Local Control Accountability Plan or LCAP which outlines a three year plan for using the allocated funds to serve the "targeted students". With input from teachers, parents, students, staff and interested community members, the District developed its first LCAP plan during the 2013-14 school year.

Language STAR Update: This year, the CUSD ELD (English Language Development) elementary instructional program, *Language Star*, has moved into the Junior High Schools continuing the district's vertical articulation. The results with elementary students have been phenomenal and as coaches, we are excited about continuing that support for Jr. High teachers. The ELD coaches have also created an overview of Language Star Methods and Principles that support the Common Core English Language Arts (ELA)/ELD standards for elementary school students. During the fall, many teachers attended a three session series for either K-2 or 3-6 and received the Common Core ELA/ELD Language Star Methods/Principles alignment. Beginning January 26, 2015, we will be offering a four session Professional Development series where teachers will receive the Common Core ELA/ELD Language Star Methods alignment along with other strategies to Maximize Student Growth.

The Hour of Code: The Hour of Code is a one-hour introduction to computer science, designed to demystify code and show that anybody can learn the basics. The grassroots campaign goal was for tens of millions of students to try an Hour of Code during December 8-14, 2014, in celebration of <a href="Computer Science Education Week">Computer Science Education Week</a>. Numerous CUSD schools participated with one or more classes working through the code tutorials. Chapman, Citrus, Little Chico Creek, Marigold, Neal Dow, Parkview, Rosedale, Shasta, and Sierra View elementary schools participated among others. **Information Technology Promotions:** Congratulations to a couple of our wonderful tech guys for their promotions: Justin Cooper is our new Information Systems Analyst and Phil Brock promoted to Network Analyst. We are currently in the process of filling 2 open Computer Tech positions.

**Chromebooks:** We have 1,650 Chromebooks in 45 carts in the district. Information about Google Apps and Chromebooks has been presented at ETAC (Elementary Technology Advisory Council) and STAC (Secondary Technology Advisory Council) as well as the district-wide training last month. We are looking to provide more in the near future.

Status of Measure E Projects: Electronics have been ordered for the next round of elementary schools which includes: Emma Wilson (beginning next week and lasting through January); Neal Dow (beginning late January); and Shasta (beginning in February). We are upgrading fiber and copper cabling and installing new electronics and wireless at these sites. This takes about a month per site to complete. We have completed Hooker Oak, Sierra View and Little Chico Creek elementary schools. Our fiber optic backbone at Bidwell is complete as well as the cabling for wireless. We will be installing the electronics at Bidwell next week. Installation of networking equipment (including wireless) at Chapman, Citrus, Parkview, McManus and all three high schools is complete.

**Measure E – District Office Data Center Update – Installation of a New Data Rack:** Our new racking system installation is complete. Servers and all fiber optics will be moved to the new cabinets in the District Office's data center on Saturday, December 12.

Email SPAM Filtering Changes: The IT Department installed a new SPAM filter on Saturday, December 13. This system replaces our previously BCOE provided SPAM solution. CUSD is implementing our own system to better manage and address the recent increase of unsolicited and "spear-phishing" emails (specially crafted emails to trick users to click and share private information). This type of threat has become one of the biggest security risks in any organization. Having control of email flow here at the District Office and being able to analyze threats as they come in will help to better secure our network. As with implementing any new technology such as this, there may be some bumps along the way. We are currently testing all the different systems that rely on email to be sure they are functioning normally.

One of the **NEW FEATURES** of our SPAM system is your ability to manage (BLOCK, DELIVER, WHITELIST/DELIVER and DELETE) messages you want to bypass the filter. Beginning December 18, you will receive an email if any of your new email messages were filtered and quarantined. This message will look like the one below and the sender will be barracuda@chicousd.org.



For any email messages you receive you can do the following for each:

- Click on the **Deliver** link to have that message delivered to your primary inbox.
- Click on the Whitelist link to have that message delivered to your primary inbox and that sender whitelisted.
- Click on the Delete link to remove that message from your quarantine.
- Click on the View link to display that message in a new Message Details browser window.

Early Assessment Program (EAP): The EAP is designed to provide students, their families, and high schools with early signals about students' readiness for college-level English and mathematics. The EAP identifies a student's need for additional preparation in these areas while still enrolled in high school. The goal of the EAP program is to have California high school graduates enter the CSU fully prepared to begin college-level study. Students deemed to be College-Content Ready based on their EAP results are exempt from taking California State University and participating community college placement tests in English and mathematics and move directly into college-level classes upon enrollment.

This year, all grade 11 students taking the state Smarter Balanced Assessments in English and Math will be able to use their overall scores as a college content readiness indicator.

- Students scoring overall Level 1 or 2 in English and/or Math will be considered Not-Yet content ready at CSU.
- Students scoring overall Level 3 in English and/or Math will be considered conditionally content ready at CSU.
- Students scoring overall Level 4 in English and/or Math will be considered content ready at CSU.

An additional pathway to demonstrate college content readiness is available to students. Beginning in spring 2015, California State Universities (CSU) will also use SAT/ACT results to indicate a conditional college content-readiness status in English and mathematics. **CSU recommends students take ACT/SAT tests by the end of the junior year.** Below are the registration and administration dates for the ACT and SAT spring 2015.

**Smarter Balanced Digital Library:** The Smarter Balanced Digital Library became operational on October 1, 2014. The Digital Library contains over 2,500 resources for SBAC consortium teachers, kindergarten through grade twelve (K-12). All CUSD teachers and administrators have been sent logins to access the Digital Library.

**Smarter Balanced Interim Assessments:** The Smarter Balanced will be releasing interim assessments intended to allow teachers to check student progress throughout the year, giving them actionable information to inform instruction and help students meet the challenge of college-and-career-readiness standards. The interim comprehensive assessments (ICAs) are expected to be available mid-January, 2015, with the interim assessment blocks (IABs) following shortly thereafter.

**2014–15 California Assessment of Student Performance & Progress (CAASPP) Testing Windows:** For Smarter Balanced English–language arts/literacy and mathematics assessments in grades three through eight, CUSD sites will set a testing window between April 15 and June 4, 2015. For Smarter Balanced English–language arts/literacy and mathematics assessments in grade eleven, CUSD sites will set a testing window between April 15 and June 4, 2015. For science California Standards Test, California Modified Assessment, and California Alternate Performance Assessment in grades five, eight, and ten, the CUSD testing window is April 9 to May 13, 2015.

**Smarter Balanced Practice & Training Tests:** Smarter Balanced Practice and Training Tests are available for everyone to try. The <u>Practice Tests</u> provide students with grade-specific testing experiences that are similar in structure and format to the Summative Assessments. The

<u>Training Tests</u> provide students with the opportunity to quickly become familiar with the software and interface features. The Training Tests are organized by grade-bands (e.g., 3–5). Due to scheduled maintenance, the CAASPP Smarter Balanced Practice and Training Tests are not available from Monday, December 15 through Sunday, December 21, 2014. Practice and Training Tests will be available once again on Monday, December 22.

California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA): The CAPA is the alternate assessment for students who have a significant cognitive disability. For 2014–15, the CAPA English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics has been eliminated and will be replaced by an alternate assessment field test. Students are required to participate in the CAPA science assessment in grades five, eight, and ten, until there is a successor assessment aligned to the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS). Students are tested individually and accommodations are provided as listed in the student's Individualized Educational Program (IEP).

California High School Exit Examination (CAHSEE): The next administration of the CAHSEE will be February 3 (English) & February 4 (Math), 2015. All grade 10 students are required to take the CAHSEE unless taking the alternate test for students with significant cognitive disabilities. There will be no changes to the CAHSEE content and question formats for the 2014–15 school year.

**Physical Fitness Testing (PFT):** The CUSD 2015 PFT testing window (grades 5, 7 & 9) will open on February 2, 2015. The summary results from last year are available for <u>schools</u>, <u>districts</u>, <u>counties</u>, and the <u>state</u>.

**California High School Proficiency Examination (CHSPE):** Registration for the March 21, 2015 administration of the CHSPE is now open. The deadline to register is 5 p.m. on February 20, 2015. More information about the CHSPE can be found at the CHSPE Web site.

National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP): Little Chico Creek will be one of 1,100 California public schools participating in the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) in 2015. Grade 4 students only will participate in this national assessment of reading, math and science on February 18. Parents will be notified of the details about this assessment via a letter from the school. For additional information about NAEP, please see go to the National Center for Education Statistics Web page.

**Civil Rights Data Collection:** Beginning in January, Civil Rights Data will be collected and compiled from each site and the district as required by the US Department of Education. The district collects required information such as enrollment, demographics, school expenditures, discipline, advanced placement, math & science courses, teacher experience and prekindergarten.

CALPADS: To fully comply with federal accountability requirements, California has enacted a data collection and reporting system, California Longitudinal Pupil Achievement Data System (CALPADS). Collection and reporting of this data is a joint effort between all CUSD schools, Business Services, Educational Services, Human Resources, Information Technology, and Nutrition Services. CALPADS data submission for Fall 1 (2014-15 Enrollment Counts, 2013-14 Grads and Drops, English Learner counts and Immigrant Counts) was certified this week. Thanks to Jen McCall, Jennifer Bevers and the many others who assisted in this effort.

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Student Works in PVHS' Cafeteria: Nutrition Services worked with Special Education Teachers, and PVHS Cafeteria Staff to open its doors and help students gain valuable work experience. Select PVHS students have been working in Valhalla assisting the kitchen crew in serving lunches to fellow students. Through the Workability program, these students are being paid for their work. Once a student reaches 16 years of age, a transition plan is developed. This plan provides opportunities to gain vocational experiences to assist them in future employment after they graduate from high school. The cafeteria jobs provide this experience in a safe, but demanding learning environment. When the students arrive for lunch, the lines become long. These new employees to the cafeteria see the importance in speed and quality of service. Besides earning money and gaining vocational experiences, these jobs have also helped the students grow in other ways. ## NEWS FROM HUMAN RESOURCES

**Negotiations with CUTA:** The District and CUTA bargaining teams last met on October 31. The District provided CUTA with a counter proposal on Article 8 (wages) and CUTA provided the District with a counter proposal on Article 9 (health and welfare benefits). While CUSD requested to present the 2013-14 unaudited actuals to help clarify the budget parameters faced by the District, CUTA declined to view the budget presentation.

## The most recent proposal from the District included:

- 2% ongoing salary increase retroactive to July 1, 2014.
- Increasing the District's contribution to health insurance premiums from \$950/month to \$985/month. This represents an ongoing benefit that approximates .6% equivalent in salary.
- \$93,810 in one time monies to be distributed how CUTA determines. The one time offer represents approximately a .2% of a salary increase.
- One (1) additional work day for the 2014/15 school year. This represents approximately a .5% increase in salary for that year.

The teams met Friday, December 19 with a mediator.

**Negotiations with CSEA, Chapter 110:** The District and CSEA, Chapter 110 negotiating teams last met on October 14. We are working to schedule times to meet in an attempt to develop a tentative agreement.

**Negotiations with CUMA:** The District recently met with CUMA leadership to discuss employee compensation. The proposal made to CUMA was the same as that made to CUTA with the exception of the additional work day.

Classified Human Resources: Classified HR is excited to offer additional opportunities for staff to attend the popular de-escalation training with Mr. Andrew Duch, Captain - Jail and Court Security Commander for Butte County Sheriff's Office. Mr. Duch's next presentations will be held on January 12, 2015, from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and from 12:00 noon to 1:00 p.m. in the Plans Room at the Corporation Yard. This training will be focused on our transportation and maintenance & operations staff. Another training is scheduled for February 9, 2015, at the Performing Arts Center at Pleasant Valley High School. The time will be 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and the target audience is to be determined. Our intention is to film the training at the PAC so that a video-based presentation is available in the event the Mr. Duch is not available for future trainings.

Our Workers' Compensation administrator, Keenan & Associates, continue to perform site inspections related specifically to slips and falls. Tim Hall is a Senior Loss Control Consultant who works in Keenan's Loss Control/Risk Management department. The intention of these inspections is to provide the District with another view of potential slip and fall hazards and to proactively address these concerns. Mr. Hall will visit every site and will provide a report to the District.

In addition, Classified HR is filling open positions and expects to have additional openings in the near future. Announcements for recruitments for Classified Human Resource positions will continue to be posted over the upcoming holiday period. So, if you are interested in additional hours or adding a new position, please check our website for employment opportunities.




## **PLAY HARDER**
