Todd and Chico Rotary have donated \$30K to be used for our music programs, including the purchase of new instruments.

ELEMENTARY EDUCATION UPDATE: The CUSD elementary schools have gotten off to a wonderful start. Many thanks to all the staff at all the schools that helped make for this smooth beginning of the school year.

SECONDARY EDUCATION UPDATE: The excitement of the first days of school was punctuated by engaging new student welcoming activities at all secondary schools: from orientations at Fair View, CAL, and Oakdale, to 7th grade orientations at Bidwell, Marsh, and Chico Junior Highs, to dynamic LINK Crew activities at Chico, Inspire, and Pleasant Valley High Schools. At all schools, the warmth and enthusiasm with which the new students were welcomed by staff and older classmates was moving. Thank you, dedicated staff, for setting the positive tone on your campuses. You clearly make the difference by building authentic relationships with your students.

Back To School Staff Development Day: Thank you for providing feedback on the August 13 Professional Development Day. The DLC used your input, from both surveys and individual conversations, to plan the day and will use your feedback to fine tune the professional development plan for 2015-16 as well as the

opening sessions for 2016-17. Please communicate your ideas to your DLC rep. The vision for professional development this year was to provide introductory sessions on August 13, with the opportunity to go deeper on a given topic over the next four 3:30-5:00pm sessions. Communication is key, so please do not hesitate to email Director David McKay your ideas or stop him in the halls when he is on your campus.

Secondary District Leadership Council (DLC): The two main Essential Questions guiding the DLC's work this year are: 1) "What does in-depth, teacher-driven professional development that directly impacts student learning look like?" and 2) "What would a useful 7-12 CUSD assessment plan look like?" Secondary DLC will meet on the first and third Wednesdays of the month and report out at staff meetings as well as sending out meeting notes. The overarching goal of the DLC is to create and sustain solid relationships on and across sites, as well as with district leadership. \$5.3 Million Career Pathways Grant Expansion: A \$5.3 million competitive grant was awarded to Chico Unified School District and the Butte-Glenn Career Pathways Consortium (BGCPC) by the California Department of Education for the 2015/2016 and 2016/2017 academic years. The regional consortium yields a powerful dynamic with a synergy of partnerships: Butte Community College, Butte County Office of Education (BCOE), Glenn County Office of Education (GCOE), Butte County school districts, Glenn County school districts, business entities, community organizations, and industry advisors. CUSD is a significant participant and the fiscal agent.

The purpose of this grant is to expand the work of the BGCPC, which was awarded a \$5.8 million grant last year. This expansion grant will support new and existing pathways from three high-wage, high-skill industry sectors: Information and Communication Technology (ICT), Agriculture and Natural Resources (ANR), and Arts and Media Entertainment (AME). Pleasant Valley High, Chico High, and Inspire School of Arts and Sciences are all adding new pathways with exciting implications for students. The consortium prefers to refer to this work as an initiative rather than a grant; while this is one-time money, the goal is to establish sustainable pathways which will afford students authentic, meaningful college and career preparation and opportunities. Information Services

Java, Shockwave and Silverlight being discontinued: This month Google will discontinue support for a multitude of Internet plug-ins. This action could have far reaching implications for both staff and students. Certain types of plug-ins are notorious for being security vulnerabilities and Google has officially pulled the plug on them. Below are the most popular plug-ins that will no longer be supported in the Chrome browser, nor in Chromebooks.

- Java
- RealPlayer
- QuickTime
- Shockwave
- Silverlight

NOTE: Flash and Adobe Reader will continue to be supported in Chrome.

How might this affect you? This transition could represent a challenge for any school that is relying on older websites or programs that use plug-ins such as Java. Information Services recommends that you begin to explore alternatives to incompatible websites and programs as they become known to you. We are always here to help.

For now both Firefox and Internet Explorer will continue to allow the plug-ins, however in time they will also follow suit. This coming year is our opportunity to migrate away from Java and Shockwave before all support ends.

Printing from Chromebooks: Many staff members have expressed interest in printing from the new staff Chromebooks. The IT Department is currently working on a permanent solution, but it is still a few months away. In the meantime you can print from your Chromebook by logging into https://view.chicousd.org and using a VIEW Windows desktop from there. A VIEW desktop allows you to run Windows 7 on your Chromebook. Simply login to the website from your Chromebook and choose CUSD-STAFF from the list.

News from Business Services

The Facts about CUSD Portable Classroom Buildings: Chico Unified School District schools currently utilize 122 portable classroom buildings. Portable classrooms were added to our campuses to accommodate growth and optimize state funding in the late 1980's and mid 1990's. The portable classroom buildings range in age from 2 years to 30 years of age. Most of the portable classroom buildings have reached or surpassed their useful lifespan. The District Facilities Master Plan includes plans to reduce the number of portable classroom buildings to 42. This reduction results in a decrease of 65% by replacing them with permanently constructed classroom buildings. No portable in the district has ever been condemned or found unsafe for students. All concerns regarding mold, fumes or unusual smells are fully investigated and Certified Independent Industrial Hygienists are utilized to perform indoor air quality tests.

M&O and Transportation Departments Were Busy Over the Summer: As you might have noticed throughout our school sites, M/O and Facilities and Construction crews were very busy this summer doing a host of projects to improve CUSD schools for our students and staff. They completed 439 work orders! The awesome custodial crews at each school did an amazing job of cleaning the schools and working around all the projects, summer school, and early back programs. During the summer, they also made inspections of our sites with the Northern California Schools Insurance Group, who helped us identify safety issues.

Fire Marshall Visits: Starting September 14 and ending September 30, M/O along with the Chico Fire Department will be conducting fire inspections at all of our school sites.

Things are Shining in Transportation: During the summer a team of transportation employees came to the Corp yard to beautify our buses. Becky, Marina, Dinah, Tammy D., Cheryl H, Char and Michael completely washed and waxed our fleet. This not only made our buses look awesome, but it helps to save water in the future because it will take less water to clean them.

We also would like to thank Becky Dawson of Papa Murphy's on Eaton Rd. once again. She has donated 500 "Great Bus Rider Awards" for our bus drivers to give out to our deserving students. The award entitles the student to a free Mini Murph Make N' Bake Pizza Kit. Each Friday one student per bus route is given this award for their excellent behavior and their ability to follow the rules of the driver and bus.

We would like to welcome Michael Swanson to the Transportation team, Michael has passed all three of the CHP test and is now driving one of our Special Ed routes. Michael is a great addition to our team.

Nutrition Services (NS) started the year off with a great back to work event held at Little Chico Creek Elementary. They partnered with Supervisor Dusty Copper and the Maintenance & Operations (M&O) crew for a BBQ lunch and a group speaker. Both teams took a great deal from the event that will be very helpful throughout the year. The de-escalation training will continue to be very valuable for years to come. Nutrition Services also held four hours of required annual training regarding new requirements that became effective on July 1, 2015. The team received training in customer service, menu production, understanding complete meals and nutrition. The great training day got the school year kicked off in the right direction for our students. The first day and week of school went very smooth. Thank you NS and M&O teams for all you do for our students. It is going to be a great 2015-16 school year.

News from Human Resources

Blood Borne Pathogen and Mandated Reporter Training: The District is in the process of providing video based training for Blood Borne Pathogen and Mandated Reporter Training. This required annual training will occur during the month of September. All employees are expected to view and sign that they have seen the training videos.

Art Contest: Our Workers' Compensation Carrier creates an annual safety calendar that uses student artwork from schools that are part of the JPA. They are currently accepting submissions from students. The deadline for submissions is **September 30, 2015**. All submissions will be judged and the top 13 artworks will be displayed in this year's safety calendar. If a student's artwork is selected the student will receive:

- 1) A copy of the calendar
- 2) A class party
- 3) Another copy of the calendar will be given to the student's teacher to display in the classroom.

More information regarding the specifics of the contest will be email to each elementary school site.

Paid Sick Leave Law: California's new Paid Sick Leave Law allows employees who traditionally have not received sick leave (such as substitutes) to accrue and use sick leave. The state's new sick leave law takes effect January 1, 2015; however, the right to accrue and take sick leave under this law does not take effect until July 1, 2015.

- Qualifications: Employees qualify for paid sick leave by working for the District on or after January 1, 2015, for at least 30 days within a year in California and by satisfying a 90 day employment period (which works like a probationary period) before an employee can actually take any sick leave. Starting on July 1, 2015, employees will earn at least one hour of paid leave for every 30 hours worked. The District will provide up to a maximum of 24 hours (three days) for paid sick leave.
- For what purposes can an employee take paid sick leave: You can take paid leave for you or a
 family member for preventive care or care of an existing health condition or for specified purposes if you
 are a victim of domestic violence, sexual assault, or stalking.

Family members include the employee's parent, child, spouse, registered domestic partner, grandparent, grandchild and sibling. **Preventive care** would include annual physicals or flu shouts. **For partial days**, your employer can require you to take at least two hours of leave. Otherwise, the determination of how much time is needed is left to the employee.

• **Do I have to give notice that I need to take my paid leave**: Employers must permit the employee to use the paid sick leave upon an oral or written request, and the law forbids requiring an employee to find a replacement as a condition for using leave. If the need is foreseeable, the employee must give reasonable advance notice, but where the need isn't unforeseeable the employee need only give notice as soon as practicable.

The District is in the process of sorting out the specifics of the law and will be informing staff of their eligibility.

TB Clearance: Employees who work in a school environment must have TB screening upon their initial employment and every four (4) years thereafter. Testing in the past has allowed for two options:

- 1) An initial skin test which requires the employee to return to the healthcare provider in three days to have the skin test read.
- 2) A chest X-ray.

New legislation has allowed for a third option. Education Code Section 49406, as amended, requires all employees of school districts, CERTIFICATED and CLASSIFIED, to undergo a TB examination.

3) This legislation now allows employees an opportunity to take a TB risk assessment questionnaire which will be administered by our Registered Nursing staff. If the responses to the questionnaire supports that the employee does not represent a risk of TB then the requirement of testing has been met.

In lieu of the Assessment Questionnaire, a TB skin test (intradermal) is still acceptable for the requirement, except that an X-ray must follow if the skin test result is positive.

The District intends to continue to offer employees a chest X-ray to meet the TB requirement. The X-ray van will be available only once a year and details specifying availability will be announced in the future.

Classified employees will still receive a courtesy reminder approximately one month prior to the expiration of their TB clearance. This reminder will now include the option for the Assessment and will advise employees to contact the Classified Human Resources office at 891-3000 x132 to schedule an appointment.

Job Opportunities: We continue to fill open positions and expect further openings in the near future. Recruitments for classified positions will continue to be posted over the upcoming holiday period. So if you are interested in additional hours or adding a new position, please check our website. Job Site Transfer/Seniority notices from the District will be mailed to the home of employees for classifications in which the employee currently holds a regular position.

Laura's Literacy Project: Numerous schools in CUSD have benefited from generous donations of books via Laura's Literacy Project. Most recently Loma Vista, Chapman and Citrus were awarded donations to expand the collection of books in their classrooms and libraries. Laura Dearden-Davidson was an educator in Paradise for 37 years, and passed away in July of 2014. She was widely known throughout the education world in Butte County. Laura's commitment to education in general, and reading and literacy in particular, was the catalyst that propelled her husband, Marvin Davidson, to start her foundation, Laura's Literacy Project. The project has raised \$50,000 to date which supports literacy in the classroom.





Teacher Feature: Michael Peck

Pathways caught up with Pleasant Valley High School teacher Michael Peck in Chico last Friday...

Outside of the classroom, what do you do for fun?

I really enjoy many of the same things I teach my students outside of the classroom as well. Much of my "free time" is spent shooting photography, filming, and editing. I also love taking my wife and kids on amazing adventures as much as possible. This summer we enjoyed adventures in Santa Cruz, Fort Bragg, Portland & Hood River Oregon, and the Turks and Caicos Islands in the Caribbean. We love experiencing the outdoors and traveling to different locations throughout the world. I am also a "vinyl head" who enjoys shopping for, collecting, and listening to various genres and styles of music on my turntables at home.

Our BGCPC-X Grant asks trios (two core academic teachers and one CTE teacher) to collaborate to produce two integrated lessons per semester. Is this a reasonable goal? How can we help you meet it?

I think this should be pretty reasonable to think that a CTE teacher and a core academic teacher should be able to collaborate this year. I think if people start small, maybe with two teachers they will find it may develop into additional opportunities to collaborate and bring in more people who will get excited about this whole collaborative concept.

Video cameras, microphones, a "green screen," and state-of-the-art audio and video editing equipment invite kids to practice hands on, real world media production.

Can you tell me about one simple way in which integrated curriculum might enhance student learning?

Integrated curriculum is amazing because it will show students a real world context of what they are learning in both their CTE and academic courses. It will also let students know that more than one teacher knows that the material is important and relevant which may create more buy in for students. And once things really start to develop students will experience education in such a cool new way that they will forget they are actually learning as they experience lessons or units that expand far beyond the classroom.

What's "in it for you?" Why might teachers actually want to make time in their incredibly busy schedules to ease into the process of making problem-based, integrated curriculum a reality on campus?

When academic teachers get a taste for what's happening in some of these CTE courses or pathways they are going to be blown away. They might see an "average" student they have in class become a leader and expert in another area. Students in CTE generally understand and come to really appreciate the skills they acquire and hands on working environments in CTE courses.

Also an opportunity for passionate teachers to actually work together on lessons and projects that they choose and believe in. I teach in the Media, Arts, & Entertainment area of CTE and I cannot wait to work with Christina Fisher who is an energetic and dedicated English teacher at PV. We are going to give our students a little taste of this "new" way of learning is all about this year. Stay tuned for more...

Bidwell Junior High Modernization

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
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
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On September 2, 2015 the Facilities & Construction Department hosted a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony for the Bidwell Junior High School Modernization project. This event celebrated the official opening of the newly renovated Administration Offices, Library, Multipurpose Room and Gymnasium. CUSD Board of Education President, Elizabeth Griffin, Superintendent, Kelly Stalely and Bidwell Jr. Principal, Judi Roth cut the ribbon and invited the public in for a tour of the newly modernized facilities.

We are scheduled to commence erection on Monday September 21, 2015. Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Upgrades at Citrus & Emma Wilson





The ADA Barrier Removal project at Citrus Elementary School has been completed. The project replaced the ADA ramp, repaired the old stairs, replaced the surrounding flatwork, refinished the landing and added thresholds to the front entry to the school.

Emma Wilson Elementary School also had Barrier Removal work done over the summer. Several walkways were leveled and two old drinking fountains replaced with new bi-level fountains that feature water bottle fillers. The students now have cool, accessible water to drink near the play areas.

Safety and Security Project: Window Coverings

As part of the District's safety and security plan, classrooms and indoor common areas in need of window coverings will receive blinds or curtains. These window covering are to be used in the event of Code Red Emergency.

Loma Vista, Marigold, Emma Wilson, McManus, Fair View, Inspire and the J&K building at Chico High School have all received window coverings in the first phase of work. The next phase of schools scheduled for

new window coverings are Shasta, Sierra View, Little Chico Creek, Citrus, Hooker Oak, Parkview, Neal Dow and Rosedale. Phase 3 will include all Junior High school and High school projects

Cabling Infrastructure Projects

Over the summer Chico Jr. High received a complete upgrade of cabling and network electronics throughout the campus. Wireless access points were installed in every other classroom, plus four outdoor locations covering the pool, P.E. field, loading zones and parking lots. New phone system cabling for classrooms and offices was installed along

with cabling locations for twenty-five future security cameras.

Marsh Jr. High is also in the process of a complete upgrade of cabling and network electronics throughout the campus. Wireless access points will be installed in every other classroom, plus six outdoor locations covering the P.E. fields, loading zones and parking lots.

New Solar Shade Structures



During summer break, solar shades structures were constructed at Bidwell Jr. High, Emma Wilson, Neal Dow, Rosedale and Sierra View. These systems were constructed on the edge of the playgrounds in order to provide shade for our students.

These projects were funded with Proposition 39 Clean Energy Jobs and a zero interest loan from the California Energy Commission. To view the energy consumption and production at each school site visit:

Through Arts for All, Mini-Grants are available for CUSD visual and performing arts projects.

You must fill out the attached application to access these funds. Funds can be used for materials, projects or student activities. All proposals will be judged by the Arts for All Grants Committee Board. The Arts for All Board will oversee the administration of each funded project.

- A report (either written or verbal) of your progress on each funded project is due one month after granting to the Arts for All board.
- A final written report, including digital photographs of the project/activity, summarizing what has been accomplished will be due one month following the conclusion of your project.

WHO CAN APPLY FOR A MINI-GRANT?

Any teacher in CUSD.

FOR WHAT CAN MINI-GRANT FUNDS BE USED?

Priority will be given to applications that have a permanent, on-going value or use. The Board will also consider one-time projects that have an impact on a significant number of students.

HOW MUCH MONEY IS AVAILABLE FOR A MINI-GRANT?

Mini-Grants will be offered each semester for projects which can be completed during that semester, based upon available funds. Funding of this nature is competitive since there is a limited amount of funding available at any time. In the future, we hope to have greater funds available, but for this current round of funding please keep requests to \$250.00 or less.


HOW TO APPLY FOR A MINI-GRANT?

- 1. Fill out an application (see below).
- 2. <u>Submit completed application ELECTRONICALLY</u> For Fall of 2015, submit by September 21, 2015 For Spring 2015, submit January 29st.
- 3. Arts for All Grant Committee Board Members read and rank the applications and make recommendations to the full Arts for All Booster group the month following the submission deadline.
- 4. Applicants are notified, in writing, by the Board of the status of their application the month following the submission deadline.
- 5. The recipient must give a report (either written or verbal) within one month following the granting of the award to the Arts for All Board outlining your progress.
- 6. Funding will come from the Arts for All North Valley Community Foundation account as a check payable either to the grant recipient, to third-party vendor(s), or as reimbursement with original receipts submitted with approval by the Arts for All board to NVCF/Arts for All.




