PVHS Art Teacher Reta Rickmers is the recipient of the 2016 National Art Education Association's Pacific Region Secondary Art Educator of the Year. Following is a write up about the award and Reta's contributions.

Reta Rickmers, Visual and Performing Arts Chair, Pleasant Valley High School, Chico, CA is the recipient of the 2016 National Art Education Association's Pacific Region Secondary Art Educator of the Year.

The National Art Education Association is divided into four geographical Regions: Eastern, Pacific, Southeastern, and Western. The Pacific Region includes: Alaska, Alberta, American Samoa, Arizona, British Columbia, California, Colorado, Guam, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming, and Yukon Territory.

Ms. Rickmers is a strong advocate of NAEA. She attended SummerVision DC in 2015, presented peer-reviewed sessions at NAEA several times on subjects such as Art Curriculum: Current and Relevant, The Art Studio@PV (an in-depth art program she developed with a six-year grant from the California Department of Education), and Post Modern Art Education in the Secondary Art Classroom. She has also presented many times at California Art Educators Association annual conferences. As a working artist, she feels that it is extremely important for art teachers to continue to make art.

She believes in having students actively engage in their community. She encourages them to use art as a way to process their lives, give back to the world through Art Service Learning, and exhibit their work to a wide range of audiences. She teaches skills, art history, conceptual thinking and originality while constantly changing the curriculum to keep it fresh and vital for her students. She has been teaching at Pleasant Valley High School since 1992.

California League of Middle Schools Educator of the Year for Region 2: Annalisa Hansen was selected as Middle School Educator of the Year for Region 2 in northern California. She was honored at a dinner in Redding hosted by the California League of Schools, a non-profit that supports education and educators. Ms. Hansen teaches English and language arts at Bidwell Junior High where she also serves as department chairperson. Ms. Hansen is noted for her passion for student success and her "students come first" approach. She volunteers in student activities and provides professional development for her staff. Fellow teachers describe her as someone who has high standards and insists that students settle for nothing less than their absolute best. They say she balances this drive, character, and integrity with humility. Her students say she makes an impression the very first day of their eighth grade year. Ms. Hansen is the representative for region 2 encompassing Butte, Glenn, Lassen, Modoc, Plumas, Shasta, Siskiyou, Tehama, and Trinity counties. She represented the region at the California League of Schools state conference on February 26 in Sacramento. Congratulations Annalisa Hansen!



CUSD Board Member Participates in CSBA Legislative Action Day: CUSD Board of Education President **Eileen Robinson** participated in the CSBA (CA School Board Association) legislative action day. Her presentation packet contained information and data in support of:

- 1. SB 871 by highlighting the complexity LEAs face meeting the LCAP implementation rubrics;
- 2. the need for support for bond dollars beyond local capacity by presenting CUSD's facilities master plan showing the need is more than double what prop 39 allows just to bring our facilities to a 60% of desired accommodation; and
- 3. SB 799 she outlined the negative impact and steps taken to avoid state takeover, when the 2007 downturn happened, taking into account AARA dollars and state onetime monies and protract it out to show what WILL happen when the next slowdown happens if we are not able to maintain local reserves above the cap.







Dedication: CUSD M&O employees are dedicated to protecting our students and staff and do so by keeping a close eye on our facilities. We would like to thank the M&O staff for going above and beyond to help catch those individuals responsible for stealing from and vandalizing our schools. Over the last few weeks, several rooms at PVHS were broken into. Police reports were filed, M&O worked to repair the damage, and new deadbolts were put on several doors. While that stopped the intruder from gaining entry on those rooms, it did not stop his attempts to enter others and some of his exploits were caught on camera. **Dusty Copper**, M&O Supervisor,

was determined to catch the individual responsible for doing damage to our schools. He was at the M&O office at 3:00 a.m. on Saturday morning monitoring the cameras at PVHS to see if this intruder would attempt to enter the campus buildings. While there, he also began monitoring other district-wide cameras. While watching the Bidwell Jr cameras, he noticed a break-in attempt happening at Bidwell. Dusty then called Chico Police as well as M&O Director, John Carver, both of whom met him at Bidwell. Chico Police surrounded Bidwell Jr. and put the suspect in custody. The suspect admitted to the break in at PVHS as well as the attempts at Bidwell. M&O is now working directly with Chico Police to develop a time line of the destructive events that have occurred on school property, including the arson fire at the snack bar at Asgard Yard. Thank you Dusty Copper and John Carver for your dedication to our schools!

News from Business Services

Maintenance/Operations: During spring break, CUSD was host at Chico High and Pleasant Valley High for the Workability 1 Program sponsored by Butte County Office of Education. The

Workability 1 Program is a school-to-work program that assists 14-22 year old students with disabilities in making the transition from high school to independent living. Their mission is to promote the involvement of key stakeholders including students, families, educators, employers and other agencies in planning and implementing an array of services that will culminate in successful student transition to employment, lifelong learning and quality of life. We had a total of 11 students who worked at both high schools for two days under the direction of **Dusty Copper**, **Eric German** and site personnel. The students had a great time and we appreciated their hard work to help beautify these two campuses. We also thank **Susan Nance** from BCOE for her hard work in getting all of us together for this great cause.







M/O and Facilities also teamed up to work on a project at Sierra View elementary inside one of the courtyard areas. Our team members did an incredible job getting the area ready for a great facelift.







Transportation: Working with Cal Fire, we had a bus evacuation training day for new recruits. They trained on how to respond to a bus in distress, how to safely evacuate the people on board, how to deal with a bus that has turned over to one that has caught on fire or a bus that has been in an accident. It is reassuring to know that these professionals have the training needed to deal with any bus related incident.







No CUSD buses were injured during this process, but a new bus was created. ☺



Nutrition Services: Vince Enserro, Crystal O'Rear, Teri Molina, and Karen Haselton visited Natomas Unified School District in the Sacramento area to investigate their nutrition program. Vince had been to the district before and saw their process and menu items and knew they ran a great program. Natomas has 16 sites and 13.500 students: CUSD has 22 sites and 13.100 students. The big difference is their free and reduced numbers: CUSD has 41% free and reduced; Natomas has 57% free and reduced. Natomas serves about 400,000 more lunches and about 230,000 more breakfasts than CUSD due to the higher free and reduced number. which means they receive much more money to spend. The CUSD group visited their central kitchen, a high school and a combo K-12 charter school. The group noted that Natomas has state of the art equipment with very new facilities. However, while wondering around their kitchen watching production and service, Teri made an observation and brought it to Vince's attention. She said CUSD's food is better than what they are doing and looks nicer. Vince slowed down for a second and looked and admitted that she was 100% correct. Vince had been caught up in all the top of the line equipment and new kitchens and missed the most important part: the food that was coming out. CUSD does more scratch cooked items, offers more choices, and just better food. Vince noted it is easy to get comfortable with what we do and overlook what an AWESOME TEAM CUSD has that puts out the BEST food. Just goes to show, all the newest stuff does not make you the best - hard work, good feedback from the sites, creative people, and the willingness to change makes us the BEST. KUDOS to our Nutrition Services Team for doing an AMAZING job. The program they have created for the students and staff is truly second to NONE!!!

News from Human Resources

Certificated Human Resources will be attending Teacher Recruitment Fairs this Saturday, April 16 at **Chico State** and again on Tuesday, April 19 at **Sacramento State**. With the shortage of teachers in California we are actively recruiting teachers for the first time in many, many years! We hope to convince the best and brightest that CUSD is an outstanding place to work and the Chico community is a wonderful place to raise a family.

Certificated Negotiations: CUSD and CUTA continue to negotiate wages, benefits, class size, the Kindergarten instructional day, elementary supervision and course loads for itinerant elementary prep-time provider teachers (PE, Fine Arts and Music). Classified HR

Future trainings: The Classified Human Resources department and Special Education Department are sending five classified employees to the Para educator conference in Ontario, California. The conference is April 12-14 and focuses on special education. Last year the conference was in San Jose and we were able to send representatives to that location as well. This conference is the largest para educator conference in the state and provides valuable insight and training to the employees that attend. It is hoped that those employees will be able to share their training with their co-workers and that some of the conference speakers can be enticed to come to CUSD and provide the same insights and training in the future.

Josh Kuersten has provided several training sessions this year to classified special education employees. In the future, the intent is to have Mr. Kuersten customize some of his training into more specialized focus areas. It is anticipated that the focus areas will be in areas such as autism, emotionally disturbed, physical handicaps, etc. We will keep you posted on when these opportunities may become available.

We are in the process of developing a survey for all classified employees to help us determine where additional training might be offered in the area of computer software. Lori Sullivan is working on the survey and we hope to have the survey out to employees in the next 30 days. Based upon the results, training opportunities will be created. We expect to provide computer software training in the Large Conference Room (LCR) at the District Office and from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. Attending this training is voluntary and notices will be sent providing specific details of the training.

All classified employees should now have an email address. Typically this email address is the first letter of the employees first name followed by @chicousd.org. As an example, Steve Jones' email address would normally be sjones@chicousd.org. Please check and confirm that you have a District email account. If you do not, contact your school office manager who should be able to assist you. You may also complete an Employee Account Agreement that can be found on the CUSD website, http://www.chicousd.org/Departments/Information-Technology/Email-Account-Request-Form/index.html and forward your completed form to Bonnie McCarthy at the District Office.

The District has provided computer locations at every work site to allow employees to check District email. The computer locations will be announced and will be available during work hours.

CHS Engineering Program: Good things continue happening for Mike Bruggeman's Engineering program at Chico High School. That is due in large part to my two Stratasys - 3D printers. We just finished a couple of new parts for VIP clients. We printed a prototype adapter for the Growler Filler for Sierra Nevada Brewery of Chico and North Carolina. That is the third project we have done for them. I have some good contacts there, I was given a great tour of the North Carolina facility this fall — it is something of an engineering masterpiece. We also completed a radiator hose prototype for Weiss McNair who manufactures nut harvesting equipment here in Chico. They plan to have a new mold created for the hose and needed a prototype for testing. We made a special slip ring in the part so they could maximize the fit. Both businesses were very satisfied with our 3D Stratasys prints. I am also attaching a couple pictures of Dillon Silverman. He is the student featured in the case study Stratasys previously did on Chico High School. Dillon now designs for Tony Stewart the NASCAR champion. I also visited Dillon at Tony's facility last fall. He said his CAD and 3D printing experience helped him land the job. He is also a student at North Carolina, Ashville. It has been fun and interesting to share what we do at Chico High and my students have learned a lot from these opportunities. --Mike Bruggeman, Chico High School Engineering & Architecture



I was spending a big chunk of my day counseling students (and sometimes parents), so they could at least focus enough to sit in their desk and be present. I was feeling more like a counselor than a teacher. I also felt horrible because the students who are motivated and able to learn were missing out on valuable instructional time during these moments. Ashley has changed that! Eighty-eight percent of my students are receiving services from her now. I'm able to do my job and my students are getting the professional help needed to get through the day. I believe having a full-time counselor here is saving lives! No joke!

I have a big love for this school and these students! Their lives and education matters! Thank you for providing the services needed so our kids can learn, feel safe, and feel supported. "Youth Build— **Butte County** Collaborative"

A new program in Butte County is helping troubled youth and young people coming out of jail and struggling with substance abuse issues gain a new lease on life.

"Youth Build-Butte County Collaborative" (YB-BCC) is helping 16 to 24-year-olds by providing opportunities to learn job skills, vocational training, earn their high school diploma, and certification in trades. The program is for youth or adult offenders or those who dropped out of high school.

"Young people spend part of the day in a classroom and the rest of the day learning job skills, like construction and welding," said Butte County Sheriff Kory Honea. "They are doing something constructive and positive. This program is about saving lives and breaking the cycle of recidivism at the Butte County Jail."

Sheriff Honea said keeping young people engaged and productive while under supervision also prevents gang involvement, curbs substance abuse and juvenile delinquency, and can serve to reduce recidivism.

This program partners with community agencies, and also provides assistance to find safe and sober living environments, job opportunities, alcohol and drug rehabilitation, career counseling, and resume writing skills.

"We operate on a wrap-around type model that works to build a continuum of care as participants move through the program," said Sergeant Eric Lyon of the Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO). "The program is up and running. Right now we have about 25 people participating."

The program runs Monday through Friday and is funded by a federal justice grant (the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant--Byrne JAG), which involves an agreement between the State of California Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC) and Butte County. BCSO is collaborating with other community and government agencies, including Chico Unified School District, Behavioral Health, Youth Build Chico, Skyway House, Sentinel Offender Services, Habitat for Humanity, and California State University, Chico.

"Opportunities for work experience and industry certifications are offered," Sgt. Lyon said. Certification from the National Center for Construction Education and Research; Multi-Craft Care Curriculum; Forklift Certification; OSHA 10 Certification; CPR/First Aid Certification; and Hazardous Material Waste Certification are possible certifications in this program.

"We want to encourage young people to be part of rebuilding the community and to plan for their future steps--whether they want to go to college, a trade school, do an apprenticeship, or start a career path," Sheriff Honea said.

BCSO oversees and manages the finances and provides some of the program participants and acts as a liaison between the local agencies and the BSCC, while providing a member of the steering committee.

The grant funding will also enable Butte County to partner with a local treatment facility to provide a sober living environment for up to three months in addition to providing outpatient substance abuse education and counseling services.

This grant-funded program demonstrates an investment in young people in Butte County and their future. Sheriff Honea reiterated, "We want young people to develop skills and have the opportunity for higher paying jobs while decreasing their dependence on criminal activity to meet their needs."
