INFORMATION, PROCEDURES AND CONDUCT OF CUSD BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETINGS

No disturbance or willful interruption of any Board meeting shall be permitted. Persistence by an individual or group shall be grounds for the Chair to terminate the privilege of addressing the meeting. The Board may remove disruptive individuals and order the room cleared, if necessary. In this case, further Board proceedings shall concern only matters appearing on the agenda.

CONSENT CALENDAR

The items listed on the Consent Calendar may be approved by the Board in one action. However, in accordance with law, the public has a right to comment on any consent item. At the request of a member of the Board, any item on the consent agenda shall be removed and given individual consideration for action as a regular agenda item. Board Bylaw 9322.

STUDENT PARTICIPATION

At the discretion of the Board President, student speakers may be given priority to address items to the Board.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATON FOR ITEMS ON THE AGENDA (Regular and Special Board Meetings)

The Board shall give members of the public an opportunity to address the Board either before or during the Board's consideration of each item of business to be discussed at regular or special meetings.

- Speakers will identify themselves and will direct their comments to the Board.
- Each speaker will be allowed three (3) minutes to address the Board.
- In case of numerous requests to address the same item, the Board may select representatives to speak on each side of the item.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATON FOR ITEMS NOT ON THE AGENDA (Regular Board Meetings only)

The Board shall not take action or enter into discussion or dialog on any matter that is not on the meeting agenda, except as allowed by law. (Government Code 54954.2) Items brought forth at this part of the meeting may be referred to the Superintendent or designee or the Board may take the item under advisement. The matter may be placed on the agenda of a subsequent meeting for discussion or action by the Board.

- Public comments for items not on the agenda will be limited to one hour in duration (15 minutes at the beginning of the meeting and 45 minutes at the end of the meeting).
- Initially, each general topic will be limited to 3 speakers.
- Speakers will identify themselves and will direct their comments to the Chair.
- Each speaker will be given three (3) minutes to address the Board.
- Once 2 speakers have shared a similar viewpoint, the Chair will ask for a differing viewpoint. If no other viewpoint is represented then a 3rd speaker may present.
- Speakers will not be allowed to yield their time to other speakers.
- After all topics have been heard, the remainder of the hour may be used by additional speakers to address a previously raised issue.

The Board is unable to read written materials presented during the meeting. If any person intends to appear before the Board with written materials, they should be delivered to the Superintendent's Office or delivered via e-mail to the Board and Superintendent 10 days prior to the meeting date.

Background Information:

As specified in Assembly Bill 86, Common Core Implementation Funds (CCIF) were allocated to school districts in 2013. The District received \$2,414,968. AB86 required the Board to adopt a CCIF spending plan. The legislation permitted the use of these funds for the acquisition of instructional materials aligned to the California Common Core State Standards, instructional technology resources, or professional development related to the implementation of the new standards. At the December 18, 2013 meeting of the Board of Education, the Board approved a spending plan which assigned 85 percent of the funds for technology resources (\$2,052,723) and 15 percent for professional development (\$362,245). As of May 6, 2015, \$32,798 have been expended for professional development activities (balance = \$329,447) and \$1,738,332 have been spent on technology (balance = \$314,391).

It is recommended the Board take action to reallocate the remaining professional development funds to the instructional technology allotment for the purpose of purchasing additional instructional technology resources. This action would make a total of \$643,838 available for this purpose. AB 86 requires that the Common Core Implementation Funds be expended by June 30, 2015.

Educational Implications:

With Board approval of this proposal, the District could purchase approximately 1,500 chromebooks for student and teacher use. To date, using these funds the District has already acquired approximately 1,650 chromebooks which are being used for assessment and instructional purposes. The Chromebooks have been well-received by students and teachers.

Providing more student and teacher access to technology is linked to Board Goal 1: "To provide all students with the opportunity to attain increasing levels of individual achievement that prepare them for success in the global economy," as well as to Goal 1 of the Local Control Accountability Plan: "All CUSD students will have highly-qualified teachers, current standards-aligned instructional materials, current technology, and facilities in good repair".

Fiscal Implications:

As per the authorizing legislation, the remaining funds will revert to the State if they are not utilized by the required date.

Background Information

Today's educational culture requires creative and options to meet the needs of every student. The days of all students attending school for six periods a day at a traditional school campus are quickly becoming a thing of the past.

More and more students and their families are looking for options, and one popular option has become known as blended learning. In this option, students are able to take some courses on campus and some in an on-line or traditional independent study model. A committee of CUSD secondary administrators began exploring options for adding online to this model. Edmentum was reviewed by the administrators and tested by some students.

The ease of use of the online system, combined with the large library of both UC/CSU approved course and Career Technical Courses makes Edmentum a good fit for the needs of Chico Unified.

Educational Implications

The on-line program will be available to students in grades 7-12 at Chico, Fair View and Pleasant Valley High Schools. Students will have the option of taking all of their classes on-line (with weekly meetings with a teacher) or taking some online courses in conjunction with the remainder of their courses on campus.

In addition, this curriculum can be utilized to support the Medically Necessary Instruction and Off Campus Instruction programs.

It provides an option for students to complete an UC/CSU a-g pathway in an online/independent study environment.

Fiscal Implications

The cost for the program is \$65,750 for a two-year agreement. The cost will come from district budgeted instructional materials funds. The agreement will be paid in two installments - \$33,150 in year 1 and \$32,600 in year 2.

Background Information

Chico Unified School District (CUSD) has been addressing safety and security needs and technology infrastructure through facility construction and modernization. Information provided by updated cameras at Chico High School and Pleasant Valley High School has been instrumental in identifying and resolving vandalism incidences in recent weeks.

Administration would like to present to the board and public the updated security camera system at our high schools, demonstrating their use and effectiveness.

Educational Implications

The District's Strategic Plan states: "A safe, nurturing and inspiring environment is essential for individuals to thrive."

Fiscal Implications

Current cost to add security cameras outside of cabling completed through facility construction and modernization has been approximately \$25,000 at each high school. The schools have used their safety and security budgets to pay for the initial installation of cameras. The district currently pays \$270 for the enterprise licensing of the Milestone system and \$36 per camera paid from the district safety budget included in the unrestricted portion of the district budget.

The district does receive pass-through revenue from a number of former redevelopment areas in Chico. A number of former RDA pass-through revenues maintained in Fund 42 are intended for the mutual benefit of the City of Chico and Chico Unified School District. Administration believes campus security improves the safety of our community and reduces the dependence and need for police and city services.

Recommendation

Administration recommends a district-wide, phased approach to installation of security cameras at our school sites. The following are the recommended phases:

Estimated on-going annual licensing cost at full implementation is \$10,170. This annual cost will be paid from district safety and security dollars included in unrestricted funding.

The cost of camera installation including the one-time license fees associated with installation will be paid from Fund 42.

The timing of phase completion will be dependent on available funding and coordinated with new construction/modernization related to cabling.

Background Information

In accordance with Assembly Bill 1200 Statutes of 1991, Assembly Bill 2756 Statutes of 2007, Chapter 1213 and with Government Code Sections, 3547.5 and 3540.2, the District is required to disclose the financial implications of collective bargaining agreements. The Board of Education (District) is also required to approve the tentative agreement, as is the Chapter, prior to the agreement being implemented.

Discussion

On Tuesday, May 12, 2015, the District and the California School Employee's, Chapter 110 (CSEA) reached a tentative agreement regarding negotiations for the 2014/15 and the 2015/16 school years. That agreement is scheduled to be ratified by the Chapter on May 19, 2015, by a vote of the membership of CSEA 110. Some of what is included in the agreement is as follows;

- Effective July 1, 2014, improves the classified salary schedule by 3%.
- Effective January 1, 2016, improves the classified salary schedule by 6%.
- The District's monthly contribution for medical insurance premiums remains at \$964.
- Effective January 1, 2016, the District's monthly contribution for medical insurance premiums for full time unit members will be \$1,022.
- Commencing with the 2016/17 negotiations and continuing thereafter, the District's required contribution for medical insurance premiums will be adjusted by the same percentage that is applied to the salary schedule for that year.
- The District will modify the current longevity steps such that step 25 will receive the same rate as the current step 30. This produces approximately a 10% increase to employees who reach the 25th year of longevity. Step 25 would then become the highest step.
- The District and CSEA 110 will form committees to deal with the following issues;
 - A. Health Assistant Hours: Through targeting in the LCAP establish funded goals to increase days worked per year and equalize and/or increase hours per day in the 2015/16 school year.
 - B. Food Services: Explore issues associated with working out of classification, extra hours, appropriate use of substitutes, and staffing patterns/formulas and arrive at agreements/solutions during the 2015/16 school year.
 - C. Transportation: Establish a committee to review contract language, MOUs, Department policies, and written/unwritten rules for purposes of memorializing agreed upon practices and clean-up.
 - D. Leaves: Explore issues related to changes in State and/or Federal law related to provision of paid and unpaid leaves not currently provided and use of sick leave to care for family members as defined by law. Enter into agreements that memorialize provision and use of such leaves.

- E. Catastrophic Leave: Explore issues with the process for granting such leave and for properly ascertaining what constitutes a catastrophic event.
- F. Training: Determine specific professional development activities wanted and needed by CSEA 110 members and develop a plan to fund and provide trainings in a cost efficient manner.
- CSEA 110 representatives will have opportunities to address newly hired bargaining unit members at the conclusion of the District's regularly scheduled orientations.

Educational Implications

To the extent that we are able to continue to recruit, train and retain highly qualified classified employees our students will benefit.

Financial Implications

As noted in the AB2756 Public Disclosure Form, the increased cost related to this agreement is \$580,357 in 2014-15, \$739,777 in 2015-16, and \$661,657 in 2016-17.

Unit members employed full time and some employed part time, together with eligible dependents, shall be entitled to vision insurance.

7.1.4.1 The District will pay the monthly premium for vision insurance for unit members employed full time. (see Schedule "C-3.")

- 7.1.4.2 Unit members employed part time and had coverage during the 1978-79 work year by agreeing to pay a pro rata share of the premiums will be provided with vision insurance in accordance with Schedule "C-3."

7.1.5 Life Insurance

Unit members employed full time and part time shall be entitled to life insurance.

- The District will pay the monthly premium for life insurance for 7.1.5.1 unit members employed full time. (See Schedule "C-4.")
- A unit member employed part time by agreeing to pay a pro rata 7.1.5.2 share of the premiums will be provided with life insurance in accordance with Schedule "C-4."
- 7.2 Long-Term Disability Income Insurance

Revised 2003

The District shall provide the Long-Term Disability Income Insurance Plan and the 30-day Plan Supplement. The district shall pay no more than an average of \$32 per month per eligible unit member for the income protection plan(s) based on the 23month average cost.

Medical Coverage for Retired Personnel (Under the Age of 65) 7.3

Added 1998/99

Any classified employee who has served in the District as an employee for a minimum of five (5) years if hired prior to July 1, 2015 or any classified employee who has served in the District for a minimum of five (5) ten (10) years in a permanent CUSD position if hired on or after July 1, 2015 and is actively serving as an employee or is on approved leave and who goes on STRS or PERS disability retirement prior to 55 years of age and at least age 50 shall be offered the opportunity to remain on the District's medical insurance by paying the premium in advance to the District. Upon reaching 55 years of age, the retiree may be eligible to receive District-paid medical benefits as outlined in Section 7.3.1. Employees who are on an approved leave of absence and reach the age of 55 they will be eligible to receive District-paid medical benefits as outlined on Section 7.3.1

Any classified employee who has served in the District as an employee for a minimum of five (5) years if hired prior to July 1, 2015 or any classified employee who has served in the District for a minimum of five (5) ten (10) years if hired on or after July 1, 2015 and who retires between the ages of 50 and 55 may continue to receive medical, dental and/or vision insurance in effect at the time of retirement by paying the premiums in advance to the District until he or she reaches the age of 55, at which time the Chico Unified School District would pay the premiums for said medical insurance as per Section 7.3.1.

To be eligible for retiree medical benefits, the retiree must: 7.3.1

CSEA: 55.

- 7.3.1.1 Have served in the District as an employee for a minimum of five (5) years if hired prior to July 1, 2015 or ten (10) years if hired on or after July 1, 2015
- 7.3.1.2 Be at least 55 years of age at the time of resignation;
- 7.3.1.3 Be actively serving as an employee or be on approved leave during the year prior to retirement;
- 7.3.1.4 Be currently enrolled in any CUSD medical plan in order to apply for extended medical coverage prior to retirement;
- Qualify, apply and be in the process of receiving retirement 7.3.1.5 benefits under the State Teachers Retirement System (STRS) and/or the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) for the year that she/he retires;
- 7.3.1.6 Be under 65 years of age in order to receive District-paid medical benefits.

If all of the above conditions are satisfied, the District shall pay the total cost of the medical insurance premium for the District group plan appropriate for the retiree and eligible dependent(s).

Exceptions to District payment shall be in cases of those retirees and eligible dependent(s) who have comparable medical insurance coverage or who qualify for Medicare. The intent of this benefit is to provide coverage until Medicare or some similar plan provides for it.

7.3.2 Optional Coverage for Retired Between 55 and 65

Any classified employee who has served in the District as an employee for a minimum of five (5) years if hired prior to July 1, 2015 or any classified employee who has served in the District for a minimum of five (5) ten (10) years in a permanent CUSD position if hired on or after July 1, 2015 and who retires between the ages of 55 and 65 may continue to receive dental and/or vision insurance in effect by paying the premiums in advance to the District.

7.3.3 Part-time Employee Medical Benefits

District-paid medical benefits for part-time classified employees who elect to continue medical insurance coverage upon retirement between the ages of 55 and 65 shall be paid by the District on a basis equal to the proportional amount paid for the medical insurance during the last year of employment in the District. However, if the employee had served a minimum of five (5) years as a full-time employee prior to becoming a parttime employee, all of the insurance premium shall be paid by the District.

7.3.4 Dependent Coverage for Retired at Age 65

CSEA: 5.5.

District: B

Retirees age 65 who have an eligible dependent(s) under the age of 65 shall be entitled to medical and dental insurance protection in accordance with the plans in effect from time-to-time during this Agreement. The premiums for said plan(s) shall be fully paid by the retiree annually, in advance, or by twelve monthly post-dated checks furnished annually, in advance, to the District.

Increased Sick Leave, Vacation, and Health and Welfare Benefits for Employees 7.4 Working as Substitutes in the Summer

Added 2000/01

- The following list shall be the requirement to obtain increased sick leave, vacation, and health and welfare benefits for work performed during the summer by employees acting as substitutes. Summer work shall be defined as substitute work performed between the first working day following the end of the traditional school year, through the last working day before the beginning of the traditional school year. These provisions shall not apply to summer school positions.
- Less than 12 month bargaining unit members acting as substitutes during 7.4.1 the summer under the supervision of Maintenance and Operations Department shall be eligible for these increased benefits. Those employees shall be on a specified list provided by Maintenance and Operations Department.
- Bargaining unit members acting as substitutes under this provision must 7.4.2 work the following percentage of the total number of days available outside the traditional school year to gain the benefit calculation.

33% = I month's credit

66% = 2 month's credit

95% = 3 month's credit

- Release time for negotiations will not be counted as absence. 7.4.2.1
- The District shall maintain the right to hire the most qualified individuals for 7.4.3 the positions.
- The parties agree that the intention of this provision is to accomplish the 7.4.4 summer work without employee absences. Therefore, vacation and sick leave are earned but may not be utilized during this summer work period and absences will be without pay.
- The additional benefits provided by this provision shall exclude 7.4.5 supplemental pay from the medical insurance plan.
- 7.5 Employee Assistance Program

Revised 2001/02

For the 2002-03-school-year, CUSD and CSEA will establish an Employee Assistance Program (EAP). This program will be funded by utilizing money available from the maximum district contribution-for-medical-coverage, which is \$575 for each full time-equivalent employee.

The EAP program shall be available to all CSEA represented employees.

The EAP program will be reviewed jointly by CUSD and CSEA in the spring of each year to determine if it is effective and/or to be continued.

Should the EAP program be discontinued at the end of the 2002-03 year, the \$4 per each full time equivalent employee will be added back to the maximum district contribution for medical coverage (ie: \$571 + \$4 = \$575), and this sub article will be removed from the collective bargaining agreement.

One Time Bonus

Employees in paid status for any period of time between May 1, 2001 through April 30, 2002, shall receive a one time off-schedule, bonus payment of one half (1/2) percent on wages earned. Any JPA rebate is excluded from the calculation.

NEGOTIATIONS/DURATION

19.1 Effective Date

Revised 2012/13 This Agreement will be in effect starting November 16, 2015 and remain in effect through November 15, 2015 2018.

19.2 Re-Openers

Annually, if either party desires to alter, modify, or amend this Agreement, either party may submit a written initial proposal to the other party by personal delivery, certified mail or registered mail prior to March 15 May 1. Upon receipt of a written notice by either party, the District shall make arrangements pursuant to the provisions of the EERA, including the Public Notice provision, for meeting and negotiating to commence.

- 19.2.1 Written notice to alter, modify, or amend this Agreement during the effective date of the Agreement is expressly limited to the Wages and Health and Welfare Benefits articles plus one additional article for either party.
- 19.2.2 The parties, if they mutually agree to do so in writing, may negotiate any portion of this Agreement during the effective date of the Agreement.
- 19.2.3 Pending a conclusion to the meeting and negotiating to modify any of the specific provisions in this Agreement, the provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

Added 2012/13 19.2.4 CSEA or the District may re-open negotiations for 2012/13 by no later than December 15, 2012.

19.3 Commencement of Negotiations

Following completion of the Public Notice requirement, no later than the third regularly scheduled board meeting after March 15 May 1, the other party's initial proposal will be submitted. Negotiations shall then commence at a mutually acceptable time and place.

19.4 Ratification of Agreement

If, during its term, the parties hereto should mutually agree to attempt to agree to modify, amend or alter the provisions of this Agreement in any respect, any such changes shall be reduced to writing, signed by the authorized representatives of the District and CSEA and ratified by the parties. Any such changes validly made shall become a part of this Agreement and subject to its terms of automatic renewal or termination. These same provisions shall apply to any Successor Agreement negotiated by the parties.

19.5 Procedures

Revised 2012/13 The parties agree to utilize the Interest Based Bargaining (IBB) process during the term of this Agreement. If the parties mutually agree to utilize the IBB process, the District will fund the training, the meetings, and the facilitator. Training in the IBB process will be provided as necessary to the teams by mutual agreement. Either party may terminate this section of the Collective Bargaining Agreement with ninety (90) days written notice.

19.6 Successor Agreement / Extension of Agreement

Either party may initiate negotiations for a Successor Agreement by providing appropriate written notice to the other party by March 15 May 1 of the calendar year in which the this Agreement expires. If, on or before March 15 May 1 of the year in which this Agreement expires, and March 15 May 1 of subsequent years, neither party gives appropriate written notice to the other of its desire to modify or terminate this Agreement, this Agreement shall be extended for another year.

The Chico Unified School District recently entered into agreements with the Chico Unified Teachers Association (CUTA) and the California School Employees Association's Chapter 110 (CSEA) for the 2014/15 and 2015/16 school years. The District has been conferring with the Chico Unified Management Association (CUMA) regarding terms of an agreement for the same time frame.

In accordance with Assembly Bill 1200, Statutes of 1991, Chapter 1213 and with Government Code Sections, 3547.5 and 3540.2, the District is required to disclose the financial implications of agreement with CUMA. The Board of Education (District) is also required to approve the tentative agreement prior to its implementation.

On May 14 the District and CUMA agreed on the following;

- Effective July 1, 2014, improves the classified salary schedule by 3%.
- Effective January 1, 2016, improves the classified salary schedule by 6.7%.
- The District's monthly contribution for medical insurance premiums remains at \$964 with **no increases** as a part of this agreement.
- CUMA members hired on or after July 1, 2015 into positions requiring an administrative credential and who completes their Tier 2 administrative credential while employed by the District in such a position with CUSD, shall be reimbursed up to \$3,000 for program tuition
- Provides for a CPA certification to receive the same stipend as is received for Masters degree.

After conferring, the Chico Unified Management Association (CUMA) and the Chico Unified School District (District) agree to the following regarding modfications to compensation. This completes discussion on these issues for the 2014/15 and 2015/16 school years.

WAGES

The Disrict proposes to increase the salary schedule as follows:

- 1. Effective July 1, 2014, improve the CUMA salary schedule by 3%.
- 2. Effective January 1, 2016, improve the CUMA salary schedule by 6.7%.

CUMA members hired on or after July 1, 2014 into positions requiring an administrative credential and who completes their Tier 2 administrative credential while employed by the District in such a position with CUSD, shall be reimbursed up to \$3,000 for program tuition.

Effective July 1, 2014 CUMA members who possess a Certified Public Accountant (CPA) certification will receive a stipend in the same manner as a Masters' degree on the Classified Management Salary schedule.

HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS

Unless otherwise specificed, CUMA members will receive health and welfare benefits for active and retired members in the same manner as is provided to CSEA, 110.

CUMA members maintain the requirement that they must work with the District for five (5) year in order to be eligible for retiree health benefits should they retire between the ages of 55 and 65.

The maximum District contribution for a full time regular employee shall be \$964 per month for medical insuracance premiums. No other increase to medical insurance or other health and welfare benefits is provided for in this agreement.

Each unit member employed full or part time for the regular school year, along with eligible dependents and eligible retirees as defined herein, will be eligible to enroll in any medical available through the BSSP-JPA. The District shall have no obligation related to a plan change/modification associated with plans available through the BSSP-JPA.

The calculation of any improvements to compensation for CUMA will include the cost of improving both salary and benefits to result in a total compensation amount. CUMA will retain the ability to determine how that increase is distributed between salary and benefits.
